CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

This course investigates the historical, present status and future direction of healthcare policy. Each DNP student will focus on leadership involvement at the institution, local, state or national levels to affect healthcare change for individuals and populations. Students take a leadership role in the legislative process through analysis and synthesis of healthcare policy. The role of politics, power and ethics as it relates to affecting change from a Christian perspective will be investigated. The *ANA Scope and Standards of Practice for Nursing Administration* will be incorporated.

COURSE COMPETENCIES: Upon completion of GNSG 703 the student will meet the following course competencies:

- **INQUIRING FAITHFULLY**
Knowledge, skill and behavior of the evidence-based practice of nursing which integrates growth in reasoning, analysis, decision-making and the application of theory with the goal of advocating for others and/or self. This includes holistic nursing skills and the nursing process.
 - a) Students will integrate a Christian perspective into the analysis and debate regarding healthcare policy (DNP 1, 4) (ACRL Standard 3, 5)
 - b) Students will appraise healthcare policy (DNP 2, 5, 8) (ACRL Standard 1, 5)
 - c) Students will formulate strategic planning incorporating politics, power and ethics (DNP 2, 5, 8) (ACRL Standard 1, 5)

- **FOLLOWING FAITHFULLY**
Defined as claiming the challenge from Florence Nightingale that nursing is a “divine imposed duty of ordinary work.” The nursing student integrates the *ordinary work* by complying with and adhering to regulatory and professional standards (e.g. ANA Code of Ethics, the California Board of Registered Nursing, Scope of Nursing Practice, SON Handbook). This includes taking responsibility, being accountable for all actions and treating others with respect and dignity.
 - a) Students will appraise current healthcare policy and make recommendations for future policy planning (DNP 1, 2, 8) (ACRL Standard 1, 2, 4)

- **COMMUNICATING FAITHFULLY**
A dynamic interactive process that is intrapersonal and interpersonal with the goal of advocating for others and/or self. Effective, culturally appropriate communication conveys information, thoughts, actions and feelings through the use of verbal and nonverbal skills.
 - a) Students will execute a plan for change regarding a healthcare policy incorporating politics, power and ethics. (DNP, 2, 5, 6, 8) (ACRL Standard 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)

- **LEADING FAITHFULLY**
The foundational relationship with Christ and others as we embrace a willingness to serve others in the midst of life circumstances (e.g., illness, injustice, poverty). Role-modeling the need for “Sabbath Rest” as a means of personal renewal, and true care of the self, so that service to others is optimally achieved. Characteristics of a servant leader include: humility, courage, forgiveness, discernment.
 - a) Students will assess historical and present status to inform future direction of healthcare policy. (DNP 1, 2, 5, 6) (ACRL Standard 1, 2, 3)
 - b) Students will develop and recommend an implementation process for a healthcare policy (DNP 1, 2, 4, 8) (ACRL Standard 1, 4, 5)

- **CARING FAITHFULLY**
A calling to the ministry of compassionate care for all people in response to God’s grace, which aims to foster optimal health and bring comfort in suffering and death.

ACADEMIC POLICIES

University: Per the PLNU Undergraduate Catalog,

- “**Academic dishonesty** . . . such acts include plagiarism, copying of class assignments, and copying or other fraudulent behavior on examination. If faculty believes a situation involving academic dishonesty has been detected, they may assign a failing grade for that particular assignment or examination, and/or the course.”
- While all students are expected to meet the minimum standards for completion of their courses as established by the instructor, students with disabilities may require academic accommodations. The admissions counselor and/or program administrative assistant has a list of persons designated to assist students. Section 504 (a) prohibits discrimination against students with special needs and guarantees all qualified students equal access to and benefits of PLNU programs and activities. Once documentation is filed, students may contact instructors to discuss reasonable and appropriate accommodations to meet individual learning needs.
- Graduate attendance: “Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. Therefore, regular attendance and participation in each course are minimal requirements. Absences are counted from the first official meeting of the class regardless of the date of the student's enrollment. If more than 20 percent of the classes are reported as missed, the faculty member may initiate the student's de-enrollment from the course without advance notice to the student. If the date of de-enrollment is past the last date to withdraw from a class, the student will be assigned a grade of "F" or

"NC." There are no refunds for courses where a de-enrollment was processed.”

- “**Examinations** may be deferred due only to illness or because of other equally valid conditions over which the student has no control”. Extenuating circumstances will be determined by the faculty of record.

- Course grade appeal may be used when a student believes the syllabus was not followed in the grade calculation or if it is thought that grading was done in a capricious and arbitrary manner. A Course Grade Appeal Form is available from the Vice Provost for Academic Administration and must be filed within one year from the end of the course in which the grade was given.

- **Electronic Mail:**
The School of Nursing has a continuing requirement for all graduate nursing students to have a PLNU email account and students are expected to check this account **Monday - Friday except holidays**. The faculty will use this account to communicate course related material with you. Scholarship notices and other important information will be posted to this account.

- **Academic Integrity:**
Students are expected to pursue their academic careers with the highest integrity in all aspects of their work. Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, cheating on a test or other coursework, plagiarism (offering the work of another as one's own), and unauthorized collaboration with another person. Copying another student's paper or any portion of it is plagiarism. Additionally, copying any portion of published material (e.g., books or journals) without adequately documenting the source is plagiarism. If five or more words in sequence are taken from a source, those words must be placed in quotes and the source referenced with author's name, date of publication and page number of publication. If the author's ideas are rephrased, by transposing words or expressing the same idea using different words, the idea must be attributed to the author by proper referencing, giving the author's name and date of publication. If a single author's ideas are discussed in more than one paragraph, the author must be referenced at the end of each paragraph. Authors whose words or ideas have been used in the preparation of a paper must be in the references cited at the end of the paper. Students found guilty of dishonesty in their scholastic pursuits are subject to penalties, which may include suspension or expulsion from the University. School policies are discussed in the Student Handbook and are available.
- The Course Instructor has the authority to determine the schedule and re-scheduling of examinations.
- All assigned course work must be completed to receive a final course grade
- A grade of at least a "B-" in each nursing theory, prerequisite, and/or co requisite course is required in order to progress to the next course or level. The nursing theory and related clinical courses must be taken concurrently and the student must receive a passing grade of "Credit" in the clinical course in order to progress to the next course or level.
