

Course Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, you will have:

1) demonstrated growing awareness of the historical, political and religious contexts of Anglican priest and evangelist John Wesley (1703-1791);

- adequately grasped the distinctive emphases and theological themes in Wesley's preaching and writing;
- demonstrated the ability to reflect critically and creatively on the possibilities of adapting Wesley's ministry to contemporary church and society; and
- 4) further developed communication skills, both oral and written, in theological vocabulary and discourse.

Course Requirements:

 Consistent and conscientious reading of assigned texts for each seminar session (CLOs 1, 2).



- 2) Consistent class attendance and participation (CLOs 1, 2). For any anticipated absence(s), please notify the professor.
- 3) Weekly journal of notes, questions, reactions and random thoughts inspired by assigned reading, due at beginning of class each **Monday** for that week's reading (CLOs 2, 3).
- 4) Leadership in discussion of one Wesley sermon (CLOs 3, 4).
- 5) A 2500-3000 word paper exploring a topic agreed upon by the student and professor relating to John Wesley's theology and/or the Wesleyan tradition. Please note the following deadlines:
 - a. Friday, Feb. 1: Approval of topic
 - b. Wed., Mar. 1: Submit bibliography
 - c. Friday, Mar. 15: Review outline with professor
 - d. Wed., Apr., 17: Final draft due
- 6) A final essay examination due by NOON on Friday, May 5. This exam will be takehome and open book/notes. You may even consult with the professor in completing the exam. The only requirement is that you do NOT consult with classmates on the exam, and that you cite all of your sources. As an alternative to the exam meeting, the class will gather for a meal at a time and place agreed upon by the entire class.

Final Grade: Will be determined on the basis of seminar attendance and participation (10%), weekly journal notes (20%), sermon discussion leadership (10%), term paper (30%), and final exam (30%).
