
To provide opportunities for faculty to develop collegiality around discussing pedagogy and best practices of teaching and learning.

Faculty Support


The past academic year, 140 full-time and part-time faculty members and 56 adjunct faculty participated in workshops or events, including 6 CTL-sponsored Faculty Learning Communities. FLC participants numbered over 50 faculty members from 13 different disciplines across campus.


In addition, CTL helped to send seven faculty members to teaching conferences this past year: four to the Lilly-West, Evidence-Based Teaching and Learning Conference, and three more to the Team-Based Learning Conference. This is a new trend that we are very excited about.

Faculty Participation




This chart represents the almost 200 faculty members (full time, part time, and adjunct) who participated in CTL events over the past academic year. There are 12 workshops, Adjunct Training Day and Faculty Development/ Scholarship Day, 6 FLC's, and 2 conferences represented in these numbers.





The Center for Teaching and Learning provided PLNU faculty with opportunities to attend and participate in twelve different types of workshops over the course of the academic year. At the end of each academic year, the CTL sends out a Qualtrics anonymous survey to all of the faculty in order to determine what FLC's and workshops the faculty are interested in participating for the following academic year.



The Center for Teaching and Learning helped to sponsor four Faculty Learning Communities during 2016-2017.

Teaching Research Methods met during FALL 2016, as did the Science Community. SoTL and Science met during SPR 2017, and Specifications Grading met during May and June 2017.

Individual Consultations and Classroom Observations

Over the past academic year, Jo Clemmons has conducted 68 individual consultations and classroom observations for faculty members.

Jo works closely with faculty to help them identify their strengths as teachers and to jointly devise strategies for course improvement. She helps faculty members to enhance their teaching by collecting information from classroom observations, IDEA Evaluation forms, and examination of teaching materials including course syllabi.

Consultations with the Director are strictly confidential. This includes the identities of those with whom we work, the information they share, and the data gathered on their behalf via classroom observations, interactions, and IDEA forms.

Consultations are voluntary, and Jo is happy to meet with anyone who contacts her.
