# "Lunch and Politics" with Bill Wachob – September 2017

IPPS hosted a lunch for students, featuring Bill Wachob, a partner with The Campaign Group, Inc., a national media and political consulting firm. Mr. Wachob was elected to the Pennsylvania State Legislature at the age of 25 and went on to serve for three terms. After his time in elected office, Mr. Wachob moved into the political consulting arena, working for PACs and political campaigns. At this event, Mr. Wachob had a very engaging discussion with a group of fifteen students about how they can and should influence the policy process.

### "Women in Local Politics" Panel hosted by CREW San Diego - September 2017

The leaders at CREW (Commercial Real Estate Women) San Diego invited me to this intimate panel session with four women in local politics: Kristin Gaspar (San Diego County Board of Supervisors), Racquel Vasquez (Mayor of Lemon Grove), Rebecca Jones (Vice Mayor of San Marcos), and Kristal Jabara (Councilwoman in San Marcos). Five students attended this event with me and had a chance to speak with these elected leaders and take pictures (right) after the panel session.



### "Coffee and Politics" with Ruben Navarrette – November 2017



IPPS was incredibly honored to have the chance to host Mr. Navarrette – a nationally recognized and well-respected speaker, columnist, and cable news contributor. He is the most widely read Latino columnist in the country, and the 16th most popular columnist in America according to Media Matters. He is a nationally syndicated columnist with The Washington Post, where his twice-a-week column appears in nearly 150 newspapers. He is also a contributor to USA Today and FoxNews.com, and a columnist for the Daily Beast. During this morning session, Mr. Navarrette spoke with the students about immigration, political participation, national and racial identity, politics in the age of Trump, and the importance of youth engagement.

### Insider Insights Seminar – February 2018

At this on-campus seminar held in the Colt Forum, three community "insiders" – Jenna Harris (Director of Outreach, Office of San Diego City Councilman Chris Cate), Wes Jones (Communications Manager, San Diego Gas and Electric) and Lisa Kalal (Vice President of Philanthropy, United Way of San Diego) – spoke to a group of twenty students about public affairs career planning, professional development, networking, and graduate school.

# <u>Life After Loma: Recent Graduates Panel – April 2018</u>

This on-campus panel consisted of four recent graduates from the Department of History and Political Science: Mitch Price (2012), Paige Woodward (2014), Corinna Hobart (2016), and Seth Patton (2017). All four of these students are currently working in San Diego in the field of law or public affairs. Twenty-two students attended the panel and listened to advice on entering the job market, making the most of an internship, and the importance of networking.

#### Other IPPS Activities for 2017-18:

During the 2017-18 academic year, I began sending students from the Department of History and Political Science a quarterly email called "things that make you go hmmmm." In this email, I include 3-5 news stories, articles, videos, or TEDTalks that touch on professional development, college life, or personal growth. Often, these links offer students information and advice on the job market, needed skills (and how to develop them), emotional intelligence, and vocational discernment. The goal is to help students develop a mindset and a skillset that will prepare them for their professional post-Loma life.
