CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Painting in oil and other media with emphasis on conceptual development and personal expression.

Additional description:

The first half of this course explores painting media beyond the oil paint methods that are covered in Painting 1, with an investigation of acrylic painting strategies, mixed media techniques, and methods for painting with technology. For the second half of the course, students are given the opportunity to develop their own body of work while strengthening the conceptual rigor of their practice through peer-to-peer interviews, development of an artist statement, and by attending a studio visit with an artist from the area. Further, throughout the course, students generate source content by keeping a studio journal, following prompts that give rise to introspection. Self-directed work is emphasized as students work towards developing their own deeply rooted professional painting practice. In-class activities, discussion, lectures, and videos facilitate the advancement of these goals.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will be able to:

- 1. Understand and utilize effective techniques for painting in acrylic.
- 2. Strategically combine various materials and painting mediums to obtain novel textures and unique visual ideas.
- 3. Apply an understanding of the role of technology in painting to a personal work of art.
- 4. Hone and utilize their own curiosities, by developing source material for their painting practice and cataloging such in a personal journal.
- 5. Visually articulate conceptually rich personal ideas through a self-directed painting project.
- 6. Articulate verbally and in writing the concepts behind this series of self-directed paintings.

REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING POLICY

Assignments: The assignments for this course are as follows:

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Acrylic painting series – January 16 – February 4
Mixed media exploration– February 4 – February 18
Painting and technology – February 18 – March 3
Self-directed project – March 17 – May 7
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The learning goals, instructions, and journal checklists for each assignment are outlined in detail on canvas.

Studio journal: In addition to painting assignments, students will keep a studio journal throughout the semester. The purpose of the studio journal is to help students to better understand and utilize their own curiosities and interests, as is necessary towards developing an effective professional painting practice.

The journal may take the form of a three-ring binder, a notebook, or may be digital. Journal assignments are meant to be completed throughout the painting process, and will be turned in at the completion of each assignment. Journal check-ins with the instructor and class are scheduled throughout the final painting assignment (which takes up the second half of the semester) to encourage accountability.

Grading criteria: All painting assignments are assessed based on painting technique, composition and color, craftsmanship, expression, and commitment to practice. A rubric outlining a more comprehensive description of each of these categories is included at the end of this syllabus.

Work outside of class: This class will meet only on Tuesdays, except where listed in the syllabus, but students are expected to work on their own during the class' Thursday time slot, or otherwise complete an extra two hours and twenty minutes of personal work

during the week. Beyond this, the course may require an extra two to six hours of work outside of class.

Late work: Work turned in between one day and one week late (1-7 days) will receive a zero in the "commitment" section of the assessment rubric, bringing your highest potential grade to a 40/50, or 80%. Work turned in more than one week late (8+ days) will not be accepted and will receive a zero as a final grade.

Clean up: Keeping the studio space clean and organized is vital to ensuring a safe and productive work environment for everyone. At the end of each class session, and at the end of any work session in the studio, all materials must be stored and work areas cleaned.

Safety with oil paint: If a student chooses to work in oil paint, they must be cleared on all safety procedures by the professor.
