#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory design course intended to provide the student with a critical awareness of the elements of art and principles of design. Experimentation in various two-dimensional mediums, and a broad understanding of art and design precedent encourages students to develop clarity and intentionality in their work, in order to effectively communicate visually. To this end, emphasis is placed on the practical ability to apply design concepts in making handmade, two-dimensional artworks.

### **LEARNING OUTCOMES**

#### Students will be able to...

- 1. Identify and critically discuss the elements of art and principles of design.
- 2. Apply the elements of art and principles of design to personal works of art.
- 3. Develop creative capacities in art and design, in order to express personal ideas with intentionality and clarity.

- 4. Develop technical skills in twodimensional mediums in order to demonstrate excellent technique and craftsmanship in handmade works of art and design.
- 5. Apply an understanding of art and design precedent to personal work(s) of art.
- 6. Utilize art and design vocabulary to intelligently critique the work of their classmates, themselves, and those in the broader art and design world(s).
- 7. Understand their strengths and weaknesses in art and design and learn from each other's strengths and weaknesses, through peer reviews and class critiques.

### **METHODS**

Instruction will be given through live class lectures, video demonstrations, small group discussions, one-on-one discussion with the instructor, videos on professional artists and designers, hands on projects, class critiques, peer reviews, and collaborative small-group prompts.

For this course, students will spend an estimated 112.5 total hours (7 hours per week) meeting the course learning outcomes. The time estimations are provided in the Canvas modules.
