## COURSE DESCRIPTION

Private, applied instruction in a performing area is a vital part of the development of Music majors, as well as an appropriate elective for many non-majors. Each level of study has defined materials and technical masteries to be achieved: 3 octave Study Scales; Suitable technical exercises – Klengel Technical Studies, Popper 40 Studies, Piatti 12 Caprices, Solos.

Students are assigned to a level according to their proficiency and mastery of materials listed for a given level.

MUA 160. First year cello: Knowledge of position 1-4 prerequisites; study scales; solo repertoire; ensemble required.

MUA 260. Second year cello: Continue scales and technical studies; suitable transcriptions and original works; Ensemble required. Junior proficiency recital.

MUA 360. Third year cello: Continued technical studies, suitable literature.

MUA 460. Fourth year cello: Continued technical studies, all 24 scales major and melodic minor; suitable literature.

- Show repertoire growth and acquisition of level-appropriate performance skills as demonstrated through student recitals and the semester Jury/Recital Video Recording and Rubric.

## COURSE SCHEDULE AND ASSIGNMENTS

**Lessons:** Technique will be addressed through scales and etudes assigned on a weekly basis. Each week students should be prepared to perform assigned solo repertoire with corrections/suggestions incorporated from previous lessons. Additional corrections/suggestions will be assigned if needed. New assignments with explanations and expectations will be given for the next week's lesson. Time for questions will be reserved at the end of lesson once all materials are covered. The student is responsible for signing up, rehearsing, and scheduling juries with the staff accompanist (or an alternative accompanist).

**Materials:** Students should provide a notebook for weekly lesson notes. Each student should also have a metronome and access to a drone (YouTube, phone app, or a physical tuner).
