COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course investigates the key aspects of business law relevant to leaders and managers of organizations. Topics include contracts, strict and product liability, organizational structures, alternative dispute resolution, intellectual property law, discrimination and human resource law. Case studies and case law will be used understand and apply legal concepts.

- 2. Recognize and apply the legal elements of contracts, torts and illegal discrimination in the daily operations of a business (PLO 2 & 3).

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

• Peregrine Leveling Module (50 points)

You are required to take the Foundations of Legal Environment of Business course assignment leveling module. The time to complete the module is estimated at 6 to 9 hours, depending on your previous level of experience.

To successfully complete the module, you must earn a minimum score of 80% on the module post-test. You are allowed to attempt the post-test twice. If you have not achieved a passing score (80%) after two attempts, you will be required to purchase a new module for \$35.00, and continue attempts until a passing score is achieved.

This module is worth 5% (50 points) of your total course grade. The deadline for completing the module is 11:59 p.m. PST on Sunday of Week 1.

• Attendance (150 points)

The class will meet face-to-face three times during the semester. You are required to be in attendance and arrive prepared for active participation. Each attendance session is worth 50 points.

• Reading Questions Discussion Board (480 points)

Eight of the 14 weeks for this course, you will have a discussion board where you are to respond to prompts for each discussion. Each assignment has a total of 60 points possible. Once you submit your initial post (worth 40 points) you need to respond to the posts of other students in your assigned group (responses total 20 points), substantiating your answers with evidence from the textbook and/or reputable online sources.

The initial post should be about 300 to 500 words and be equivalent to a short answer responding to the initial prompt. Your response posts to other students should be insightful, either agreeing with the initial author and expanding on what he or she said or challenging and correcting what the initial author stated in their post. In this way, you will grow in your knowledge of the content, while also learning from different perspectives on the issues.

The final grade for each assignment takes into consideration all of your relevant posts.

• Harvard Business Review (HBR) Case Discussions and Paper (200 points)

Throughout the course you will be assigned three HBR cases to read and discuss. Each case is 50 points and the paper is 100 points. You will be graded on your clear, well-articulated answers to the multiple prompts for each case. These papers should generally be about 1,500 words; a two to three-page paper. Each of these papers are to be done individually and submitted through Canvas. Each paper will have a specific rubric that will show you the key points that make up the grade for the paper.

• Final group HBR case (120 points)

A group assignment to be completed by the end of the last week of class. The case will be discussed at the final face-to-face class meeting and then finalized by the group and submitted through Canvas as a team project. Your paper will need to be formatted according to APA style.

COURSE SCHEDULE

The course is structured with 7 modules of 2-weeks each. Each module has a scheduled theme. See the Canvass course for weekly details of each assignment.
