COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is intended to expand the student's drawing abilities beyond the basic skills and processes covered in previous courses, towards a focus on advanced technique and conceptual ideation.

Emphasis is placed on developing the student's creative process, cultivating careful visual perception, and deepening the student's commitment to a personally engaged, contemporary drawing practice.

LEARNING GOALS

Students will be challenged to:

1. Develop and broaden their mark making sensibilities by exploring line quality and nontraditional drawing media.
2. Deepen their understanding of how to capture light in drawing, and use light and dark values strategically to communicate an idea or express a feeling.
3. Use drawing to communicate a story or sequence of events.
4. Work with their classmates to create a collaborate drawing in a small group.
5. Create a drawing that interacts with real world space through a drawing installation.
6. Hone and utilize their own curiosities, by developing conceptually rich source material for their drawing practice, and documenting such in an ongoing journal/sketchbook.
7. Articulate verbally and in writing the basis of their artistic choices.
8. Critique their own work, the work of their classmates, and the work of those in the larger art world(s), using relevant art and design vocabulary.

METHODS

Instruction will be given through: class lectures, demonstrations, small group discussions, one-on-one discussion with the instructor, videos on professional artists, hands on projects, class critiques, and a presentation from a professional working artist.

ASSIGNMENTS + REQUIREMENT

Supplies: Students are expected to have basic drawing supplies ready to use during each class session. A list of recommended drawing supplies is listed on page 7 of this syllabus. **Students may need to purchase additional supplies throughout the semester to meet the needs of individual projects.**

Work outside of class: While each assigned project for this class will involve in-class work time, it is important that students schedule about 4-6 hours *of extra work time* each week in order to fully complete each project to the standard that is expected. Students should consistently come to class showing progress in their work that reflects this extra time spent.

Grading criteria: Projects will be graded based on drawing technique, composition, craftsmanship, expression, and commitment to practice. The full detailed rubric is included on canvas in each assignment module.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance at all classes is required. Attendance means that you are prepared for class with all necessary materials, and actively engaged with the content.

- Missing four classes will result in your final grade being reduced by one letter grade.
