- 4) Articulate the basic content of the books of the New Testament and the methods appropriate to the interpretation of those books.

This course is one of the components of the General Education Program at Point Loma Nazarene University, under the category of "Responding to the Sacred." By including this course in a common educational experience for undergraduates, the faculty supports the study of Scripture and Christian heritage as foundational in the pursuit of knowledge and the development of personal values.

ASSIGNMENTS AT-A-GLANCE

Specific assignment information for weekly homework, as well as instructions and rubrics, will be posted to Canvas.

Readings (or viewings) & Weekly Homework: The NT is the primary text for this course. Please have your Bible at hand in class. All readings are required. It is important to keep up with the readings on a session-by-session basis or the information will quickly become overwhelming. A significant part of the student's grade comes from weekly homework and/or quizzes over the assigned reading material (see below). These will be due on Tuesdays. Students completing 11 assignments may drop their lowest score; students completing 12 may drop the two lowest scores. Thursdays we will often have break-out discussions over the course material for that day, read from passages in the New Testament, and practice for your final project.

<u>Mid-Term exam</u>: The midterm exam will cover various reading assignments and associated class lectures through the first quad. A study guide will be provided. It will be timed and open book/open note.

<u>Group Work:</u> Each student will be assigned to a small group to facilitate discussion and processing of course material. Occasionally you will be asked to submit a short assignment

which you may begin in class and finish outside of class if necessary. Any out of class group work should be able to be completed remotely.

<u>Final project</u>: As the culmination to the semester, there will be a final project due (submitted online) during our final exam period. We will practice these skills in class, especially during the second half of the semester. You will have a choice of format (paper, video, visual presentation, etc.) A complete instruction sheet and rubric will be provided. Briefly, you will be asked to: Choose any passage (about 10 verses) from the New Testament and <u>interpret</u> it in <u>two</u> ways:

- 1) A historical interpretation: what do we know about the original audience for this passage? How do scholarly sources help us understand this passage in its own literary context, its cultural context, and in light of the whole of the Bible?
- 2) A contemporary application for today: how might people <u>today</u> interpret this passage from their own context? How might they compare it to their situation? What message from God (hope, guidance, peace, etc.) might they find as they reinterpret this passage for their time?
