designed to help you become more comfortable with a culture of speed and collaboration.

We follow a human-centered design process that includes planning and discovery, ideation,

prototyping, and refinement.

- Create a portfolio-ready website design

Course Structure

This is a studio class with time devoted to lectures, discussions, practice activities, design work

sessions, and critiques. The class consists of in-class projects, a final project, and reading/viewing assignments to complement course work. Unless otherwise arranged, only

ART 3015 work may be worked on in class.

Assessments and Grading

Class Participation: Come to class prepared, work hard during class hours, and participate in class discussions and critiques.

Presentations: Students should give insight into your design process and demonstrate competency in the course material.

Deadlines: Students are expected to have all their assignments delivered on time by the start of the class they are due. For each day late, the student's grade on this assignment will be reduced by 10%.

Deliverables: Deliverables required for in-class critiques (i.e., research, designs, prototypes, presentations, etc.) should be uploaded to the course Google Drive folder before class begins.
