

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a survey of world societies from the era of European voyages of discovery to the formation of a global civilization in the late 20th century. While discussing a wide array of places and times, we will focus on themes that explore the connections between societies. These themes include: the development and influence of ideas and ideologies; the impact of various forms of political and religious organization; the causes and consequences of both violence and non-violence; and the historical struggle to define and protect human rights. Underlying all of these themes will be a consistent question: How does this add to our understanding of the world as we know it today?

- 4. Critically evaluate several of the major beliefs, ideologies, and values that have influenced the modern world.
- 5. Assess your own culture within the context of the process of globalization since 1500.
- 6. Examine historical developments with a particular emphasis on values and ethical choices, in light of being global citizens.

Your participation grade will come from some assignments and discussions that will be posted on Canvas. These will be graded as credit/ no credit, so you can get the full participation grade just by participating in these! **Online discussions cannot be turned in late, since by their nature, they require timely interaction with your classmates.**

To help you be prepared for our classes and ready for a thoughtful face-to-face conversation, online quizzes on the reading will be given before most class periods via Canvas. Please make sure to do the quizzes on time. **Quizzes cannot be made up** if you

miss them. It is your responsibility to regularly check Canvas for these assignments. Please do not rely on the "to do" list that Canvas generates. Make sure to actually go into our course and look through the module for each week, to make sure you don't miss any assignments.

You can experience various aspects of history in the places they actually happened, watch historical films, or hear guest speakers and reflect on those experiences. If papers, projects, or activities are turned in late, they will be subjected to a

10% penalty per day. Please ask me for more information if you believe you will need to turn in an assignment late.

PLNU Attendance and Participation Policy

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation.

As it says in the Catalog, students are expected to do two hours of preparation for each hour spent in class. I have designed the readings and assignments with this in mind.

Due to our current pandemic conditions, there is the possibility that classes may periodically need to be held in an asynchronous or synchronous online format. The attendance policy still applies to these types of class formats. Our course will follow all of the PLNU policies related to Covid-19.
