COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 2 unit class delivered over 15 weeks. Questions for Guest Speakers

In conjunction with the reading, I have asked some of my friends and colleagues from the industry to join us in class (usually via Zoom) to provide some real world insight into the different roles in the world of theatre. You will be required to form 5 thoughtful questions for these guest speakers to be turned in on Canvas before the start of class.

Play Critique

You will be required to attend one theatrical performance and write a paper critiquing the writing, the acting, the directing and the design. I do my best to find affordable or free productions around San Diego for you to attend. Please hold onto a ticket or program as proof of your attendance. You may see plays or musicals. Live performances that do not count are: live music, the ballet, a choir performance.

Theatrical Eras Group Project

You will be arranged into groups for our section on theatre history. You will be expected to teach the class about your topic (a historical era in theatre). It will be required for you to divide the work between you, each presenting an aspect of the theatrical era.

"Produce a Play" Final Paper

In your final project you will be required to select a play of your choosing and imagine that you are the director/producer for that show. Why did you choose this play? What is your concept? How is it different from past productions? You will compose a 5-7 page paper and an accompanying visual component (i.e. a model of the set design, a powerpoint of your concept).
