COURSE DESCRIPTION

An introduction to the theory and practice of the human communication process, with an emphasis on public speaking. This course will also introduce students to interpersonal and group communication, public speaking, gender communication, and nonverbal communication.

- 3. Assemble communication competency strategies, examining topics in interpersonal communication and gender communication and explaining the function of nonverbal behavior (GELO 1a, 1d)

COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of deenrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation.

In some courses, a portion of the credit hour content will be delivered asynchronously and attendance will be determined by submitting the assignments by the posted due dates. Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition
