Media Elements (300 points): The portfolio site will include media elements such as photos, videos, graphics, audio clips, etc. The quality of these elements will be assessed for a total of 30 percent of the final grade.

Writing (200 points): The portfolio site will include written elements such as news stories, headlines, captions, etc. The quality of these elements will be assessed for a total of 20 percent of the final grade.

Participation (200 points): As a workshop course, the class is most effective when students share their work at regular intervals, attend class sessions to provide peer feedback, and meet deadlines. Participation will be assessed for a total of 20 percent of the final grade.

Social Media (100 points): Social media components will be assessed for a total of 10 percent of the final grade.

Site Structure (100 points): The structure of the portfolio site's organization and navigation will be assessed for a total of 10 percent of the final grade.

Visual Design (100 points): The portfolio site's visual design will be assessed for a total of 10 percent of the final grade.

STATE AUTHORIZATION

State authorization is a formal determination by a state that Point Loma Nazarene University is approved to conduct activities regulated by that state. You can try again on another story and still receive full credit for a given project category.

PLNU highly recommends that students speak with their professors during the first two weeks of each semester/term about the implementation of their AP in that particular course and/or if they do not wish to utilize some or all of the elements of their AP in that course.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be deenrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation.
