Foundational Explorations Mission

PLNU provides a foundational course of study in the liberal arts informed by the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In keeping with the Wesleyan tradition, the curriculum equips students with a broad range of knowledge and skills within and across disciplines to enrich major study, lifelong learning, and vocational service as Christ-like participants in the world's diverse societies and culture.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of representative works of literature and cultural contexts. This section will be an intensive listening course designed to allow students to explore the development of rock music in the context of American culture in the second half of the 20th century.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the Conclusion of the Course Students will be able to:

- Closely listen to and critically analyze rock music.
- Recall, identify, and use fundamental concepts of musical study to listen to and discuss rock music such as
 - Standard musical terminology
 - Modes/genres of rock music
 - Elements of rock music genres
 - o Rock musical periods (dates, performers, characteristics, and important developments)
 - o Contemporary critical approaches to rock music

- Extra-musical research related to rock music
- Analyze the social, cultural, ethnic, gendered, and/or historical contexts of the works and their creators and connect the music with their own lives.
- Create detailed and informed analysis of rock music that examine several of the fundamental concepts of popular culture study.

FOUNDATIONAL EXPLORATIONS LEARNING OUTCOMES

Lit 2000 is a course approved for credit in the Foundational Explorations program of PLNU. Its content is designed to help students meet General Education Learning Outcome 2c: "Students will demonstrate an understanding of the complex issues faced by diverse groups in global and/or cross-cultural contexts."

REQUIRED TEXTS AND RECOMMENDED STUDY RESOURCES

No text is required for the course, but you must have access to a streaming listening service such as Spotify or Apple Music. Selected resources will be posted on the Canvas site for you to read at times.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Listening: Dates for the listening assignments are clearly indicated on the schedule and in Canvas. Listen daily if possible and complete all listening prior to the class session when the music will be discussed.

Discussion: The success of the course will be directly related to the quality of daily discussions. Each of you should feel comfortable contributing to discussions. And each of you should bring any questions you have about the reading to our attention during the course of our discussions.

Listening Journals: Rather than listening quizzes, I will ask each of you to maintain a listening journal. To receive full credit for the assignment, the journal must be at least 3,000 words in length. To receive 90% of the points, the journal must be at least 2,500 words in length. To receive 80% of the points, the journal must be at least 2,000 words in length. To receive 70% of the points, the journal must be at least 1,500 words in length. To receive 60% of the points, the journal must be at least 1,000 words in length.

Writing: Each student will complete a brief reflective essay, a final exam, and various shorter written assignments. Late essays will receive a ten percent daily deduction and will not be accepted when the value would be zero.

Oral Presentation and Paper: In groups no larger than five, students will complete view a rock documentary approved by the professor and record a Youtube video to be viewed by their classmates. Class presentations must be between seven and ten minutes in length. Individual and group grades will be given for the project. The AAC&U Oral Communications rubric will be used to assess the presentation which will be worth 100 points. The group members will receive one grade for the oral presentation. Each student must complete an essay of 500-750 words related to the presentation. The essay can be primarily informative in nature and must draw upon at least three secondary sources such as reviews of the documentary. In addition, students will receive credit for viewing and commenting on five presentations by their classmates. More details about this assignment will be posted in Canvas.
