- 4. You will preach on given passages of Scripture.
- 5. You will engage scholarship in the field of preaching and homiletics.
- 6. You will reflect on your own sense of vocation.

ASSIGNMENTS

1. All-Class Discussions on Canvas

The All-Class Discussions on Canvas make up 15% of the student's course grade. The All-Class Discussions will be primarily due on Mondays with responses due on Wednesdays. During these discussions, you will have the opportunity to interact with everyone in the course. Be sure to follow the rubrics for the All-Class Discussions.

2. Group Discussions on Canvas

The Group Discussions on Canvas make up 15% of the student's course grade. The Group Discussions will be primarily due on Thursdays with responses due on Saturdays. During these discussions, you will have the opportunity to interact with a small group from the course. The groups will switch each week to give you an opportunity to encounter meaningful interaction with various students in the course. Be sure to follow the rubrics for the Group Discussions.

3. Reading Quizzes

Reading Quizzes make up 10% of the student's course grade. There will be 3 reading quizzes, and they will function as a self-evaluation score on the quality of your reading.

To be more specific, students will score their own reading based on the following scale:

- 10 = I read every word of the assignment and took excellent notes.
- 8 = I read the vast majority of the assignment and took notes.
- 6 = I read more than half of the reading assignment.
- 4 = I read very close to half of the reading assignment.
- 0 = I read very little to none of the reading assignment.

4. The Gospel of John Reading Journal

The Gospel of John Reading Journal makes up 10% of the student's course grade. Each student will keep a journal of her/his reading of the Gospel of John and the *Take Up Your Mat* book. You will write in this journal in correspondence with each of the chapters in the book and submit your reflections each week.

To be clear, you will need a notebook to write down your reflections, questions, answers, and experiences. The notebook can be a classic paper notebook or it can be an ongoing Word document. You will need to respond to all of the "Reflect on this" prompts throughout each chapter. However, you should also write anything that seems relevant to you. If something intrigues you, make a note of it and come back to it in your journal. If you find yourself making personal connections to your own stories, experiences, prayer life, and cultural scripts, be sure to include this in your journaling.

There are seven chapters of the book and seven weeks of this course (not counting the intensive week). The journal reflections will be due accordingly.

- Week 1: Turning Water into Wine (John 2:1-11)
- Week 2: The Healing at the Pool (John 5:1-15)
- Week 3: The Feeding of the Five thousand (John 6:5-14)
- Week 4: Jesus Walking on the Water (John 6:16-24)
- Week 5: Intensive Week
- Week 6: Restoring the Blind Beggar (John 9:1-41)
- Week 7: The Raising of Lazarus (John 11:1-44)

Week 8: The Miraculous Catch of Fish (John 21:1-14)

Please know that you **will not** be graded on spelling, grammar, argumentation, or sentence structure. For this assignment, you simply need to get it done consistently and on time. Here are the requirements for your reading journal:

- The journal must be submitted on Canvas at the end of each week, including the face-to-face week
- The journal will be one document that is updated each week.
- Submit the journal as a PDF.
- The journal must either be typed or very legible handwritten scanned pages. If you have a
 question as to whether you can consistently handwrite in a very legible manner, then please plan
 to type your journal.
- The journal needs to show a clear organization with an entry for each question of the designated chapter of Take Up Your Mat.

5. Intensive Week Participation

Participation during the intensive week is important Class participation is important for the success of the class and your learning.

This includes participation in course dialogue, online dialogue, classroom activities, and any planned course pilgrimages. The professor may call upon any student to answer a question or expound upon a particular topic or reading. Students who are regularly punctual and present without unexcused absences or tardies have met the bare minimum requirement for participation, namely being present. These students can expect to earn at least a D for their participation score at the end of the semester. Students who do this but also *regularly participate* in classroom dialogue in a substantive manner can expect to earn at least a B for their participation grade. Students who exemplify regular participation can expect to earn an A for their participation grade at the end of the semester.

Regularly participating in class means you are consistently offering thoughtful comments and questions as well as respectfully supporting the regular participation and perspectives of fellow students. You do not have to agree with your fellow students, but you are not to fight with your students. Come to the (literal and metaphorical) table with the humility and readiness to learn from your peers, share with your

peers, and challenge your peers when appropriate. Rather than simply finding a way to talk a lot, focus your concern on doing your part to promote meaningful course dialogue regarding the reading and classroom activities.

When meeting in-person, please know that some activities may involve group work, standing, walking, and presentations in front of the class. If you foresee any concerns, please let the professor know in advance. This way alternative activities may be considered. If you feel uncomfortable about being in a group with particular individuals, please let the professor know before the first day of the face-to-face week. You will need to let the professor know who you don't feel comfortable being in group with, but you will not have to let the professor know why.

Some important points need to be noted here:

- 1. Comments should not go longer than one minute, unless otherwise specified. Some prompts will require longer responses. This will be made clear.
- 2. If we are talking about the reading and you have not read, simply listen instead of coming up with random things to say.
- 3. This is a graduate level course in theology and ministry, which means we may explore diverse ideas engage tough topics that most avoid. If you are not ready for this kind of discourse, please consider dropping the course.
- 4. This is a program meant to prepare students for a life of ministry. You ought to interact with pastoral graces and demeanor.
- 5. You are not to verbally or physically attack anyone in the class. Any version of a verbal or physical attack can lead to immediate removal from the course.
- 6. If you consistently distract students from the intended conversations and/or your way of being present proves to be a hindrance to students' learning, you will receive a zero for the module week participation score and may be removed from the course.

5. Preliminary Sermon

The Preliminary Sermon makes up 5% of the student's course grade. Each student will preach a sermon during the face-to-face portion of the course. The purpose of this assignment is for you to preach a sermon based on what you've already learned in your various studies and ministry experiences. You must pick one of the following passages for your sermon:

- John 2:1-11
- John 5:1-15
- John 6:5-14
- John 6:16-24

You will preach the sermon during the face-to-face week, and your specific preaching day and time for this will be given to you on the first day of the face-to-face week. It is important to know that this is not a

"mock sermon." This is a real sermon, and the context for preaching includes everyone in the class. Keep your fellow students and any potential guests in mind as you prepare and preach your sermon. Don't worry about making this sermon "perfect." The goal is for you to give it your authentic best. Here are the requirements for the preliminary sermon:

- Submit your detailed sermon outline in a Word document on Canvas by <u>1pm on August 2, 2021.</u>
- The sermon must be 10-15 minutes.
- Preach the sermon on the assigned passage on the assigned day and time.
- Participate in a Feedback and Q & A session in class regarding your sermon.
- Be sure to pay close attention to the rubric in your preparations.

6. Preaching in Context

The Preaching in Context makes up 15% of the student's course grade.

Each student will preach a sermon in her/his own context of ministry and submit a video recording of this preaching moment to the course Canvas page. You will then listen to the sermons of three peers and offer helpful feedback.

This sermon must take place within the context of an actual worship gathering. For those who do not preach regularly, this will require you to coordinate a preaching opportunity with the pastoral staff and congregation. If you serve in a context that will not allow you to preach on the basis of gender restrictions, you can coordinate the preaching opportunity with a congregation that is different from your own. If you need the professor to provide a signed letter to explain this assignment to your pastor or church board, simply let the professor know during the first week of the course. If your context of ministry will not allow you to preach for other reasons, please discuss this with the professor before trying to coordinate with a different congregation.

This preaching moment should take place during Weeks 5, 6, or 7 of this course (Aug 8 to 22). This way, you can make use of insights from the course. However, exceptions for an earlier sermon can be made if necessary. Be sure to consult with the professor before assuming you have already been approved for an exception.

Please begin arranging the date and video recording for this assignment early. You do not want to find yourself struggling to pull it together at the last minute.

Here are the requirements for the sermon:

- Submit the link for your video-recorded sermon to Canvas by <u>August 22, 2021</u>.
- The sermon must be 15 to 25 minutes. If your church tradition expects a longer sermon, it can be longer than 25 minutes.
- It can be a revised version of the preliminary sermon you preached in class, but it does not have to be.
- Be sure to pay close attention to the rubric and sermon evaluation forms provided during the face-toface portion of the course.

Here are the requirements for the responses:

- Listen to the entire sermons of three classmates
- Your feedback needs to be 250 words per sermon watched. That will total at 750 words.
- Offer honest encouragement
- Offer helpful constructive feedback on:
 - Organization of the sermon
 - Biblical engagement
 - Congregational engagement
 - Delivery

7. Written Sermon

The Written Sermon assignment is worth 15% of the student's course grade. Each student will write a sermon based on either John 11:1-44, John 21:1-14, or an a different approved passage. It is important to know that this sermon has to be written as a full manuscript. Along with a full manuscript, students will need to complete several practices and forms that "show the work" of sermon preparation. These practices and forms will be discussed and provided during the face-to-face portion of the course.

Here are the requirements for the sermon:

- Submit your entire Written Sermon and attached sermon preparation documents in a single word document on Canvas by <u>August 29, 2021</u>.
- Once again, the sermon preparation documents will be discussed during the Intensive Week.
- The sermon must be 8 to 12 double-spaced pages with 12-point font and 1-inch margins (excluding the additional forms).
- Be sure to pay close attention to the rubric in your preparations.
