COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course helps students create a portfolio which serves as a significant portion of the final assessment to the program. Students will create a portfolio that presents findings concerning the Lines of Inquiry (LOI), which are students' personal research interests in the field of organizational leadership developed in the first course in the program. The LOI have helped students identify applications of material in each course in relation to their own interests in the field. The portfolio will be an accumulation of this information, complemented by current research in the field, and made presentation-ready for future professional use.

INSTITUTIONAL LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Learning, Informed by our Faith in Christ

Students will acquire knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world while developing skills and habits of the mind that foster lifelong learning.

2. Growing, In a Christ-Centered Faith Community

Students will develop a deeper and more informed understanding of others as they negotiate complex professional, environmental and social contexts.

3. Serving, In a Context of Christian Faith Students will serve locally and/or globally in vocational and social settings.

PROGRAM LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Evaluate how Christian values support the practices of leadership within an organizational system.
- 2. Interpret how organizational knowledge relates to management, the practices of planning, leadership of change and conflict, and oversight of human resources, and illustrate how that integrates with Christian, legal, and regulatory roles.
- 3. Analyze the evidence of personal leadership style, strengths, and skills, and how that supports their various functions within an organization.
- 4. Adapt leadership concepts to real life organizational situations.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

The following student learning outcomes will be achieved by this course; students will be able to:

- 1. Create a portfolio that highlights a well-researched Line of Inquiry (LOI) that focuses on an area of interest in organizational leadership. (PLO 3)
- 2. Synthesize current research on an LOI in organizational leadership throughout the program. (PLO 2)
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge and application of an LOI within the field of organizational leadership by participating in an Expo Event. (PLO 4)

While there is no specific textbook for this course, both the <u>APA Style and Grammar Guidelines</u> website and the *APA Publication Manual* (7th Edition) will be referenced throughout the course, and students are encouraged to use both regularly. Additionally, the <u>Purdue University OWL</u> (Online Writing Lab) website is a valuable resource for help with general writing tips and APA format and style.

Note: Students are responsible to have the required textbooks prior to the first day of class. Students are also encouraged to begin reading the books in preparation for the class as soon as possible. It is also highly recommended that students do not rent books or sell back books once a course is completed in order to provide textual references for the final projects and for textual references after the program is completed.

COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION AND STUDENT LEARNING HOURS

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 1 unit class delivered for 15/16 weeks of instruction. It is anticipated that students will spend a minimum of 37.5 participation hours on their coursework. As a graduate course, students can expect the work in this class to be significant, and students should plan on spending 2-3 hours a week engaged in the course. A satisfactory grade to pass this course is a C. A grade of C- or below is considered failing. The grade of C can only be earned twice throughout the duration of the program. A GPA of 3.0 is required to maintain good academic standing in the program.

SPECIFICATIONS GRADING (SPECS GRADING)

In this course, as well as all MAOL courses, a method of grading (Specs Grading) is used for specific assignments: devotionals (when used) and discussion posts. This grading very clearly outlines the specific requirements which must be met to earn all points for the assignment. If any requirement is not met, the student does not earn points for that assignment. The professor has the discretion of giving a certain amount of tokens (a chance to re-do the assignment) during the course.

FINAL PROJECT POLICY

Successful completion of this class requires participating in the Expo Day and submitting the final portfolio project **on its scheduled day**. No requests for alternative submission days will be approved.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments are to be submitted by the due dates. There will be a 10% reduction of possible points for **each day** an assignment is late and assignments will **not be** accepted for credit four days after the due date. If missing assignments result in the failure to meet learning outcomes, students may receive a letter grade reduction on the final grade in addition to the loss of points for missing work. Assignments will be considered late if posted after the due date and time using Pacific Standard Time. No assignments will be accepted after midnight on Sunday night, the last day of class.

Exceptions for extenuating circumstances must be pre-approved by the instructor and the program director.
