

## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

A first course in statistics for the general student. Description of sample data, probability theory, theoretical frequency distributions, sampling, estimation, and hypothesis testing. Not applicable toward a major in mathematics.

- 1. Students will be able to apply their technical knowledge to solve problems.
- 2. Students will be able to compute measures of central tendency for data.
- 3. Students will be able to compute measures of dispersion for data.
- 4. Students will be able to use statistical methods to test hypotheses.
- 5. Students will be able to understand and create arguments supported by quantitative evidence, and they can clearly communicate those arguments in a variety of formats.

# **COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION**

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 3-unit class delivered over fifteen weeks. ## ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

## **Graded Components**

- Weekly Classwork: Attendance at the Wednesday in person class is required. In these class meetings, we will work on activities and problems. Some classwork may be graded, and some you will get full credit for just by attempting them.
- Online Homework: This homework will be completed in Achieve, available through the online access key. You will have multiple attempts to complete each problem. I suggest you start before Monday and use our homework class day for any problems you are having trouble solving.
- Written Homework: The homework is designed to allow you to grasp the concepts of Statistics; it is not an end in itself. The homework problems will be taken from the textbook and hand written on paper. There may also be other activities that are completed as homework. Each homework set will usually be due one week from when it is assigned. Please see attached schedule below. Late homework will not be accepted. A homework assignment is late if it is not submitted at the beginning of class on the due date. Your lowest homework score will be dropped prior to computing the final course grade.
- Labs: The labs are due at the scheduled dates and times, and are submitted ONLY in Word, Excel, or PDF format in Canvas. Late lab assignments will not be accepted. A lab assignment is late if it is not submitted at the beginning of class on the due date. Your lowest lab assignment score will be dropped prior to computing the final course grade.
- Examinations and the Final Examination: Examinations and the Final Examination will include problems and questions over material assigned in the textbook, readings and handouts, as well as material presented in class. No examination shall be missed without a well-documented emergency beyond your control. A score of zero will be assigned for an examination that is missed without a well-documented emergency beyond your control. The examination schedule is included in the daily schedule.

#### FINAL EXAM:

Date and Time: Wednesday, May 3, 2023 in the Large Central Room at Liberty Station

The final exam date and time is set by the university at the beginning of the semester and may not be changed by the instructor. This schedule can be found on the university website and in the course calendar. No requests for early examinations will be approved. Only in the case that a student is required to take three exams during the same day of finals week, is an instructor authorized to consider changing the exam date and time for that particular student.

### **Grading Scale**

Grades are based on the number of points accumulated throughout the course with the following exception. A student must pass at least one of Examination 1, Examination 2, or the Final Examination in order to pass the class. That is, a score of 60% must be achieved on one of the Examinations, or else the final grade will be an F regardless of all other point totals. ### STATE AUTHORIZATION

State authorization is a formal determination by a state that Point Loma Nazarene University is approved to conduct activities regulated by that state. In certain states outside California, Point Loma Nazarene University is not authorized to enroll online (distance education) students. If a student moves to another state after admission to the program and/or enrollment in an online course, continuation within the program and/or course will depend on whether Point Loma Nazarene University is authorized to offer distance education courses in that state. It is the student's responsibility to notify the institution of any change in their physical location. #### **INCOMPLETES AND LATE ASSIGNMENTS**

All assignments are to be submitted/turned in by the beginning of the class session when they are due—including assignments posted in Canvas. Incompletes will only be assigned in extremely unusual circumstances.

### **CLASS ENROLLMENT**

It is the student's responsibility to maintain their class schedule. Should the need arise to drop this course (personal emergencies, poor performance, etc.), the student has the responsibility to follow through (provided the drop date meets the stated calendar deadline established by the university), not the instructor. Simply ceasing to attend this course or failing to follow through to arrange for a change of registration (drop/add) may easily result in a grade of F on the official transcript.

#### Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition
