COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course studies major Christian ethical theories and view of the moral life. It also examines contemporary moral issues such as justice, war, peace, work, and family.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

This course will operate as a reading seminar course with one week set aside for instruction. Multiple measures of evaluation are used in this course, allowing students opportunities to demonstrate their learning in more than one way, and giving consideration to individual learning styles.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

1. Essay Assignments

o There are written assignments due in Weeks 6 through Week 8 of this course. These essay assignments must reflect graduate-level writing and critical thinking.

2. Discussions

Each week students will participate in online Discussion Board Posts and Peer Responses with classmates, which are related to the week's readings and content. These discussions emulate the interactive dialogue that occurs in the traditional classroom setting.

Regular and punctual attendance at all **synchronous** class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions (virtual or face-to-face), the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation. In some courses, a portion of the credit hour content will be delivered **asynchronously** and attendance will be determined by submitting the assignments by the posted due dates. Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition
