COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is one of the components of the General Education Program at Point Loma Nazarene University, under the category of "Seeking Cultural Perspectives." By including this course in a common education experience for undergraduates, the faculty supports the survey of human endeavors from a historical, cultural, linguistic, and philosophical perspective, including developing critical appreciation of human expression – both artistic and literary.

This course endeavors to explore literature through the theme of HORROR.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

In this survey of major literary texts of Horror Literature, students will recognize characteristic feature of the texts and their genres, gain a sense of their historical, cultural, and literary contexts, and develop their own skills on critical reading, thinking, writing and speaking. By the end of the semester, a student should be able to do the following:

- 1. Understand and appreciate diverse forms of artistic expression
- 2. Closely read and critically analyze texts in their original languages and/or translation.
- 3. Recall identify and use fundamental concepts of literary study to read and discuss texts (standard literary terminology, modes/genres of literature, elements of literary genres, literary periods (dates, writers, characteristics, and important developments), and extra-literary research).
- 4. Analyze the social, cultural, ethnic, gendered and/or historical contexts of the works and their authors, and connect the texts with their own lives.

COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

**NOTE: I DO NOT ACCEPT LATE WORK except under extreme circumstances. You must notify me ahead of time. The key here is to communicate, communicate, communicate! I can only work with you if you talk to me. Quizzes, discussion boards, etc. will NOT be available after the due date/time. ALSO MAKE NOTE OF THE HEAVY READING LIST. YOU WILL BE READING A LOT, AS A SHORT COURSE MOVES QUICKLY.

Discussion Boards: You have a total of 8 discussion boards due during the course: 2 during week 1, 2 during week 2 (one of which is a collaborative poem), 1 during week 3, 2 during week 4 (one of which is a collaborative short story), and 1 during week 5. Except for the collaborative poem and short story, you must write about 250 words in response to the original questions AND respond to one other classmate. Directions will be provided each week for each discussion board.

All parts of all discussion boards will be due by 11:59 p.m. each Thursday. Make sure to get both your answer in AND a response to a classmate by then. Discussion board will open on Mondays.

Quizzes: You will have two each week, due by 11:59 p.m. Tuesday and 11:59 p.m. Friday. Each quiz will be 5 questions of varying types. They will be based on the readings through Tuesday for the Tuesday quiz and through Friday for the Friday quiz. See reading schedule to make sure you are reading the correct text and pages. Quizzes open up 24 hours before they are due.

Recorded lectures: I will have lectures for you to view each Monday and Wednesday. I will share with you information about the readings in addition to other topics, such as literary terms, theory, etc. I expect you to view these videos, and I can see through Canvas who has viewed these videos.

Longer assignments: You will have one essay due during the course, and you will have one project due as well. Both assignments carry a heavy weight. Pay close attention to the prompts provided. Make sure to talk to me about any questions about these and if you are having trouble deciding on a topic or project, as you will have some choices.

STATE AUTHORIZATION

Personal Conduct: All communication, behavior, responses to classmates, posts to discussion boards, and other interactions are expected to be professional in nature. Please do not make any potentially offensive comments to your classmates or professor. If you wouldn't say it/write it/do it in a professional setting, then don't do it in our virtual classroom. Any behavior

deemed unprofessional, disrespectful, or disruptive by the professor will have consequences such as failing the assignment or a referral to the administration.

INCOMPLETES AND LATE ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments are to be submitted/turned in by the beginning of the class session when they are due—including assignments posted in Canvas. Incompletes will only be assigned in extremely unusual circumstances.
