#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

An introduction to the theory and practice of the human communication process, with an emphasis on public speaking. This course will also introduce students to interpersonal and group communication, public speaking, gender communication, and nonverbal communication.

# **COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION**

## ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

There are 1,000 total points to earn in this course through assignments and activities. Here is a breakdown of the distribution of points amongst assignment groups:

- **Speeches (320 total points):** Self-introduction Speech, Informative Speech, and Persuasive Speech
- Assignments (380 total points): Individual/group Discussions, Research Assignments, Speech Topic Proposals and Outlines, Personal Journal Reflections, and Surveys.
  - Unless otherwise indicated in the Canvas assignment, each written assignment/discussion/reply must be at least a well-written, welldeveloped paragraph with a topic sentence stating your perspective on the provided prompt, supporting sentences that develop your perspective, and a concluding sentence that wraps up the paragraph. Be sure to keep replies civil and respectful.
- Lessons (100 total points): Quizzes within interactive lessons
- Exams (200 total points): Midterm and Final, each worth 100 points
- Extra Credit: Up to 60 bonus points (due by last day of class):
  - Reflections: For up to 10 points per reflection, email me reflections on any of the course material or responses to any of the questions in the course text. Each reflection should be a well-developed paragraph.
  - Show-and-Tell Video: For up to 10 points per video (2-3 minutes), post a Show-and-Tell video to the Extra-Credit Discussion tab, where you share one of your talents or interests with the class your song, poem, painting, reflection on a Bible verse, etc.
  - Get-to-Know-You Video: For up to 10 points per video (2-3 minutes), post a Get-to-Know-You video to the Extra-Credit Discussion tab, where you introduce yourself to the class.

#### **Online Asynchronous Class Attendance**

Students taking online courses with no specific scheduled meeting times are expected to actively engage throughout each week of the course. Attendance is defined as participating in an academic activity within the online classroom which includes, but is not limited to:

- Engaging in an online discussion
- Submitting an assignment
- Taking an exam
- Participating in online labs
- Initiating contact with faculty member within the learning management system to discuss course content.

# Note: Logging into the course does not qualify as participation and will not be counted as meeting the attendance requirement.

Students who anticipate being absent for an entire week of a course should contact the instructor in advance for approval and make arrangements to complete the required coursework and/or alternative assignments assigned at the discretion of the instructor. Acceptance of late work is at the discretion of the instructor and does not waive attendance requirements.

Students may be warned if they demonstrate a lack of academic activity. After a warning, students who miss more than one week of academic activity without prior approval and arrangements with the instructor may be de-enrolled or withdrawn from a course. If the date of de-enrollment is past the last date to withdraw from a course, the student will be assigned a letter grade of "F" or "NC." There are no refunds for courses where a de-enrollment was processed after the last date to withdraw from a course.

#### COURSE MODALITY DEFINITIONS

- 1. **In-Person:** Course meetings are face-to-face with no more than 25% online delivery.
- 2. **Online:** Coursework is completed 100% online and asynchronously.
- 3. **Online Synchronous:** Coursework is completed 100% online with required weekly online class meetings.
- 4. Hybrid: Courses that meet face-to-face with required online components.

In some courses, a portion of the credit hour content will be delivered asynchronously, and attendance will be determined by submitting the assignments by the posted due dates

#### ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI) POLICY

We're currently in a time of transition and learning with AI. In this course, you're welcome to treat AI as you would a human resource: You can bounce ideas off of the AI. You can share some of your writing with the AI and ask for grammatical advice (as long as you're comfortable with your work becoming part of the AI's training, with no compensation for you!). You can have a conversation with the AI as you're planning a speech.

However, my expectation is that the work you submit in class is primarily authored by you. A key learning path in our class involves practicing different writing skills, and neither of us will know what you're learning if you overly rely on AI to produce your writing.

Thus, when you do use AI to any degree, you must document and credit the AI tool. For example, paraphrased text generated using ChatGPT should include a citation according to <u>APALinks to an external site.</u>, <u>MLALinks to an external site.</u>, or <u>Chicago StyleLinks to an external site.</u> generative AI citation guidelines. If you use the AI for brainstorming and editing assistance, include a footnote that thanks the AI for the specific assistance it provided you. Failure to properly cite/credit AI when used to any degree constitutes plagiarism and warrants academic-integrity charges.

As always, do not hesitate to contact me if you have any questions about the best way to proceed with AI, as it's always better to be safe than sorry.

# LANGUAGE AND BELONGING
