Catalog Description: A survey of the human communication process. Emphasis is placed on intrapersonal, interpersonal, and public communication. Particular attention is paid to the preparation and presentation of speeches.

This course is designed to provide you with the skills needed for effective public speaking and communication in multiple contexts. These skills include preparing and organizing a speech, developing speech content, and presenting a speech. In addition to the public speaking component of this course, emphasis will also be placed on intrapersonal communication (communication with the self) and interpersonal communication with others). We will study topics such as nonverbal communication, listening, interviewing, working in groups, and conflict resolution.

Course Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- describe and discuss the process of human communication
- identify and explain the basic components of an effective speech
- interact competently in dyadic, and small group experiences.
- construct and deliver informational and persuasive speeches

Foundational Explorations Mission

PLNU provides a foundational course of study in the liberal arts informed by the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Course Credit Hour Information

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 3 unit class delivered over 16 weeks. It is anticipated that students will spend a minimum of 37.5 participation hours per credit hour on their coursework. For this course, students will spend an estimated 112.5 total hours meeting the course learning outcomes. The time estimations are provided in the Canvas modules.

Course Required Speeches

Speeches: There are two major speaking assignments required for this course: an Informative Speech, and a Persuasive Speech. Speech assignments will also require an outline, works cited page, and peer feedback.

Note: You must complete both major speeches (Informative and Persuasive) in order to pass the class, regardless of point totals.

Discussion Boards

Part of being in a classroom community is participating in a timely manner on the weekly discussion board. Therefore, late posts or replies will not be given points. There is an automatic 5 point deduction if you don't reply to two classmate's posts on each discussion board. Always feel free to share your own opinions and feelings just be polite and considerate. Some topics will be controversial. That's ok! I don't expect you all to share the same opinion. If we all thought the same what a boring world we would live in!

Assessment and Grading

Student grades and feedback will be posted in the Canvas grade book promptly after each assignment has been graded. It is important to read the comments posted in the grade book as these comments are intended to help you improve your work.

Rounding: Typically, grades follow the scale below and are not rounded up. Rounding of grades is only done in rare circumstances when the percentage point after the decimal is extremely close to the next grade and the student has demonstrated exemplary participation in the course. Any possible changes are made by instructor discretion; please do not request that your grade be rounded up.

Incompletes and Late Assignments

All assignments are to be submitted when they are due—including assignments posted in Canvas. In general, no late or makeup written assignments/presentations will be allowed. In the event of a personal emergency with advance communication and at my discretion, make-up work *may* be accepted for half credit.
