COURSE DESCRIPTION

NRS 4031 Leading Faithfully in Diverse Health Systems Practicum (1 unit)

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 1-unit class delivered over 5 weeks. For this 1-unit course, a minimum of 40 hours must be in partial fulfillment of Public Health California Code of Regulations (PHCCR) 1491. The clinical site(s) is a community agency serving vulnerable populations of individuals, groups, and communities throughout San Diego. All clinical sites must be approved by faculty prior to participation or service.

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- All assigned course work must be completed to receive a final course grade and progress in the program.
- All assignments are to be submitted as specified by faculty, including assignments posted in Canvas or completed in practicum.
- In order to receive a passing grade in the course, the student must achieve a cumulative average of 75% on all tests. Grades/points will not be rounded. For example: 80.5% does not round to 81% resulting in a grade of C+ instead of a B-. A grade of less than a "C" (below 75%) prohibits the student from continuing in the nursing program until the course is repeated with a satisfactory grade of ≥ C.
- A grade of at least a "C" in each nursing theory, prerequisite, and/or co requisite course is required in order to progress to the next course or level. The nursing theory and related clinical courses must be taken concurrently and the student must

- receive a passing grade of "Credit" in the clinical course in order to progress to the next course or level.
- Throughout the curriculum students may repeat one nursing or prerequisite course. With the need for a second repeat of any nursing course the student will be dismissed from the nursing program.
- Students in all SON programs must earn a passing grade for a course's signature assignment in order to pass a course.
- Students must be present for the signature assignment presentations in order to earn any credit/points for the entire assignment.

METHODS OF ASSESSMENT & EVALUATION

The student must meet a minimum of 75% of the standards listed on the *Clinical Assessment & Evaluation Form* to received "Credit."

REQUIRED LEARNING ACTIVITIES

In addition to the Disaster Management Project (See grading criteria in NRS 4030 syllabus), the required learning activities for this practicum will include:

- Concurrent clinical experience in partial fulfillment of Public Health California code
 of Regulations (PHCCR) 1491 and in accordance with the American Public Health
 Association's (APHA) definition and practice of public health nursing (Section
 2013): Public health nursing is a specialty practice within nursing and public health. It
 focuses on improving population health by emphasizing prevention and attending to
 multiple determinants of health. Often used interchangeably with community health
 nursing, this nursing practice includes advocacy, policy development, and planning,
 which addresses issues of social justice.
- Individual activity at the clinical site: Includes assessment, planning, and implementing public health education activities with community clients concurrent with theoretical knowledge in public health (NRS420) pursuant of a Public Health Nurse certificate. CCR1491(6)(A)-(C) In compliance with California Business and Professions code 2816.
- Training in the Prevention, early detection, intervention, California Reporting Requirements, and treatment of child neglect and abuse per CCR1491(7)

 based on the assigned reading with integration of clinical examples from the
 student's practice.

CONTENT WARNING

I acknowledge that each of you comes to PLNU with your own unique life experiences. This contributes to the way you perceive various types of information. In this *NRS4030 Leading Faithfully in Diverse Health Systems* course, all of the class content, including that which may be intellectually or emotionally challenging, has been intentionally curated to achieve the learning goals for this course. The decision to include such material is not taken lightly. These topics include compassionate care, death and dying, lateral violence, nurse burnout, risk for suicide, and disaster. If you encounter a topic that is intellectually challenging for you, it can manifest in feelings of discomfort and upset. In response, I encourage you to come talk to me or your friends or family about it. Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of nursing research and evidence-based practice, and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.

INCOMPLETE AND LATE ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments are to be submitted by the due dates. There will be a 10% reduction of possible points for **each day** an assignment is late, and assignments will **not be** accepted for credit four days after the due date. Day 1 starts on the specified due date/time. Assignments will be considered late if posted after the due date and time using Pacific Standard Time. No assignments will be accepted

after 2359 on Sunday night of the last week of class. Incompletes will only be assigned in extremely unusual circumstances.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition

A day of attendance in asynchronous content is determined as contributing a substantive note, assignment, discussion, or submission by the posted due date. Failure to meet these standards will result in an absence for that day. Instructors will determine how many asynchronous attendance days are required each week.

Fully online courses

Students taking online courses are expected to attend each week of the course. Attendance is defined as participating in an academic activity within the online classroom which includes posting in a graded activity in the course. (Note: Logging into the course does not qualify as participation and will not be counted as meeting the attendance requirement.)

Students who do not attend at least once in any 3 consecutive days will be issued an attendance warning. Students who do not attend at least once in any 7 consecutive days will be dropped from the course retroactive to the last date of recorded attendance.

Students who anticipate being absent for an entire week of a course should contact the instructor in advance for approval and make arrangements to complete the required coursework and/or alternative assignments assigned at the discretion of the instructor.

Make up for clinical hours is at the discretion of the faculty. All clinical hours must be completed and/or or made-up. It is the responsibility of the student to initiate communication regarding arrangements for make-up. Failure to complete clinical hours will result in a "No Credit" for the clinical practicum and an incomplete for the co-requisite theory course.

USE OF TECHNOLOGY
