COURSE DESCRIPTION

NSG 2050: Nursing of Individuals: Adult Health I (3 units)

Examination of clients emphasizing skills in history taking, physical, psychological, cultural, and spiritual assessments.

- All assigned course work must be completed to receive a final course grade and progress in the program.
- All assignments are to be submitted as specified by faculty, including assignments posted in Canvas or completed in practicum.
- In order to receive a passing grade in the course, the student must achieve a cumulative average of 75% on all tests and quizzes. Grades/points will not be rounded. For example: 80.5% does not round to 81% resulting in a grade of C+ instead of a B-. A grade of less than a "C" (below 75%) prohibits the student from continuing in the nursing program until the course is repeated with a satisfactory grade of ≥ C.
- A grade of at least a "C" in each nursing theory, prerequisite, and/or co requisite course is
 required in order to progress to the next course or level. The nursing theory and related
 clinical courses must be taken concurrently and the student must receive a passing grade of
 "Credit" in the clinical course in order to progress to the next course or level.
- Throughout the curriculum students may repeat one nursing or prerequisite course. With
 the need for a second repeat of any nursing course the student will be dismissed from the
 nursing program.
- Students in all SON programs must earn a passing grade for a course's signature assignment in order to pass a course.
- Students must be present for the signature assignment presentations in order to earn any credit/points for the entire assignment.

FINAL EXAMINATION POLICY

Successful completion of this class requires taking the final examination on its scheduled day. The final examination schedule is posted on the <u>Class Schedules</u> site. If you find yourself scheduled for three (3) or more final examinations on the same day, you are authorized to contact each professor to arrange a different time for <u>one</u> of those exams. However, unless you have three (3) or more exams on the same day, no requests for alternative final examinations will be granted.

Academic Integrity

PLNU ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATIONS POLICY

PLNU is committed to providing equal opportunity for participation in all its programs, services, and activities. Students with disabilities may request course-related accommodations by contacting the Educational Access Center (EAC), located in the Bond Academic Center (EAC@pointloma.edu or 619-849-2486). Once a student's eligibility for an accommodation has been determined, the EAC will issue an academic accommodation plan ("AP") to all faculty who teach courses in which the student is enrolled each semester.

PLNU highly recommends that students speak with their professors during the first two weeks of each semester/term about the implementation of their AP in that particular course and/or if they do not wish to utilize some or all of the elements of their AP in that course.

Students who need accommodations for a disability should contact the EAC as early as possible (i.e., ideally before the beginning of the semester) to assure appropriate accommodations can be provided. It is the student's responsibility to make the first contact with the EAC.

INCOMPLETE AND LATE ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments are to be submitted by the due dates. There will be a 10% reduction of possible points for **each day** an assignment is late and assignments will **not be** accepted for credit four (4) days after the due date. Day 1 starts on the specified due date/time. Assignments will be considered late if posted after the due date and time using Pacific Standard Time.

PLNU ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions (3 class sessions), the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent (6 class sessions), the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university withdrawal date or, after that date, receive an "F" grade.

SON PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

Students are required to adhere to professional standards while students at PLNU. The nursing department had developed these standards to provide clarification of expected professional behaviors.

- 2. Behaving with honesty and ethics
- 3. Respectful communication techniques
- 4. Being proactive versus reactive
- 5. Accepting accountability for one's own actions
- 6. Being prepared and punctual

Additional Guidelines

Social networking sites are a great way to connect with many others. These sites can be used to your disadvantage and all persons are advised to employ professional standards on these sites. A general

rule would be if what you have posted does not enhance your professional image then it probably needs to be reviewed.

The use of laptops, cell phones and other electronic devices is at the discretion of the course instructor. Generally, it is considered inappropriate to use any device for alternate uses not related to the class being taught. Cell phones should be kept on vibrate or silent during class times unless arrangements have previously been made.

Speaking negatively, relating stories or presenting a biased viewpoint about any class, instructor or other student that is not supportive of the individual involved and can be perceived as incivility. Disagreements are a part of life, but should be worked through in a private manner. Questioning the integrity of a persons' character is disrespectful. Each person is responsible and accountable for their words and actions.

Plagiarism or cheating *in any class* (nursing or non-nursing) will have consequences within the School of Nursing. Disciplinary action will be at the discretion of the instructor, the guidance of the Associate Dean and/or Dean of the School of Nursing, and may include assignment/class failure and possible dismissal from the program.

COURSE-SPECIFIC POLICIES

- A student's classroom contribution is vital to the academic environment at Point Loma. Classroom contribution is more than just asking thoughtful questions, it also involves respectful attention to what others are saying. This is not only good because what is being said might be on a test, but it is also just a common courtesy. Although it does not need to be said to most college students, texting or playing on one's phone detracts from the classroom environment. In this class, students are not permitted to use their laptop computers, cell phones, or other electronic devices during class, unless instructed to do so by the professor.
- Bring a computer to each class session. Many sessions will require students to access online
 materials. Exams and quizzes are only available in Canvas. If a student does not have their device,
 they will not be able to complete the quizzes/exams.
- Students who are late when a quiz is in session may not start the quiz and will receive a score of "0". Late entry for exams may be permitted, however extended time is not given to complete the exam.
- Class sessions are designed to promote student participation and collaboration. Assigned readings and mastery quizzes should be completed before class.
- Classes are not recorded and there is no option for remote attendance.

Your instructors understand the demands of sophomore year and are here to help you as much as possible. We encourage you to communicate with us, especially if you find yourself falling behind or struggling with course content. The information you are learning is like a new language and not everyone is fluent right away. Our primary role as your faculty is to support you and connect you with resources that may be helpful. We are here for you.

STATE AUTHORIZATION

State authorization is a formal determination by a state that Point Loma Nazarene University is approved to conduct activities regulated by that state. In certain states outside California, Point Loma Nazarene

University is not authorized to enroll online (distance education) students. If a student moves to another state after admission to the program and/or enrollment in an online course, continuation within the program and/or course will depend on whether Point Loma Nazarene University is authorized to offer distance education courses in that state.
