COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores traditional and contemporary strategies for developing both an expressive and realistic rendering of the human body. To this end, techniques for capturing correct proportions are demonstrated and practiced, and the study of anatomy is surveyed to aid in depicting skeletal and muscular details.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of the course students will be able to...

- Deepen their command of a range of traditional and contemporary drawing materials.
- Strengthen their perceptual acuity through use of various figure drawing techniques, in order to draw the figure accurately from life.
- Effectively utilize inventive line quality and expressive value to add creative voice to their work.
- Apply figure drawing techniques to express personal and inventive visual ideas.
- Contextualize the conventions, ideas, and traditions of figure drawing in art history and in contemporary practice.
- Utilize drawing vocabulary and critical thinking skills to critique the work of their classmates, themselves and those in the broader art world(s).

METHODS

Instruction will be given through: class lectures, demonstrations, small group discussions, one-on-one discussion with the instructor, videos on professional artists, hands on projects, class critiques, peer reviews, and a special presentation from a professional working artist.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance at all class sessions is required. Attendance in class means that you are prepared for class with all necessary materials, and actively engage with the discussions or working on your drawing project during the entire class period.

- Missing four classes will result in your final grade being reduced by one letter grade.
- Missing five classes will result in your grade being reduced by two letter grades.
- Missing six classes will result in failure of the class.
- Coming to class late three times is equivalent to one absence.
- If you need to miss class because you are sick or have an emergency, please communicate this with me via email.

STUDIO POLICIES

Clean up: Keeping the studio space clean and organized is vital to ensuring a safe and productive work environment for everyone. At the end of each class session, and at the end of any work session in the studio, all materials must be stored and work areas completely cleaned of excess charcoal, graphite, or other media.

STUDENT CONDUCT

- **NO** headphones/air pods are allowed to be worn during class.
- Cell phones should be on silent and refrained from using during class.
- No cell phones are to be used or out when a model is present for class.
- No comments, remarks, photos, laughing are to be made/or directed at the model.
 Otherwise you will be dismissed from class.
- Arrive on time and be prepared to participate in all class activities, projects, discussions, and critiques. Each student is expected to contribute to the discussion.
- Bring all necessary tools and supplies. Coming to class unprepared is the same as an absence.
- It is likely that students will need to spend time outside of class to finish assignments.
- To receive a grade on your coursework you will submit to canvas on the due date.
- Your work may be photographed/documented for educational purposes.

In-Class Drawings	A large portion of class time will be used to complete various drawing prompts. These drawings may be completed during class, but since everyone works at a slightly different pace, some students may find they need extra time outside of class to fully complete their work. Sketchbooks	Sketchbooks are meant to develop and strengthen your <i>creative capacities</i> , by offering an opportunity for personal experimentation and exploration, building off of the content covered in class.
