A study of the attest functions of independent public accountants with emphasis on the philosophy of auditing. Topics include auditing standards, professional conduct, legal liability, internal control, audit evidence and techniques, and accountants' reporting responsibilities.

Accounting Major Fianal Exit Exam:

- All accounting majors are required to demonstrate knowledge of material expected of persons who graduate with a major in accounting. You are required to take a department exam that will be administered by the Fermanian School of Business (FSB) as a requirement in Auditing.
- The exam will test your knowledge of material beyond that presented in this Auditing course.
- Exam dates will be April 19th and April 20th. Scheduling details will come from Alondra Beltran, the Administrative Assistant to the FSB Dean. A regular scheduled class, tentatively on April 17th will be cancelled to compensate for the Accounting Exit Exam date.
- After the exam is administered, a grading scale will be developed by the FSB and points will be assigned depending on your performance on the exam. You must pass this exam to qualify for an Accounting Major or complete alternative requirements as designated by FSB.
- A total of 50 points is possible. It is imperative that you take this exam seriously and do your best. A poor score, relative to your peers, will result in a score significantly less than 50 points.

PLNU Attendance and Participation Policy

Regular and punctual attendance at all **synchronous** class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions (virtual/remote or face-to-face), the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment.
