Chemistry 1001 (Chemistry and Society) Spring, 2024

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Section 1: 2:30-3:35; MWF: 1/08/24 - 4/26/24; LBRT 203

This is a four unit course taught by the Department of Chemistry. Designed to introduce non-science students to the major ideas of modern chemistry and their relevance in contemporary society. Chemical principles are examined and applied to areas such as nutrition, medicine, agriculture, pollution, and energy issues.

Meets a Foundational Explorations requirement; does not count toward any Chemistry Department majors. **Prerequisite(s):** MTH 0099 or equivalent.

- 1. **Student Outcomes:** The following outcomes are expected and will be assessed on exams and quizzes:
 - a) Demonstrate knowledge of fundamental principles of atomic structure, bonding, acids and bases, oxidation and reduction, and basic nomenclature
 - b) Demonstrate knowledge of fundamentals of nuclear chemistry
 - c) Demonstrate knowledge of key terminology in organic chemistry and biochemistry.
 - d) Demonstrate knowledge of key concepts in air and water quality as well as energy production and consumption.
 - e) Perform research on a topic and make a presentation intended to teach others about the key concepts.

FE learning outcome 1e will be assessed in this course using student performance on problems that are quantitative in nature on the comprehensive final exam.

2. <u>Texts</u>: Hill, J.W.; McCreary, T.W.; Kolb, D.K. Chemistry for Changing Times, 15th edition, Prentice Hall, 2020. This text is **required**.

Mastering Chemistry Allocation: This is a web based homework site. You are required to purchase access. If you bought a new book from the book store you already received access to Mastering Chemistry in your bundle.

- 3. <u>Internet Resources and Communication</u>: You will be required to access this course on Canvas. I will place chapter notes for the class on this sight that you will have to print out prior to class. The notes will contain blanks which you will be required to fill in during lecture. The notes may contain some information that is not in the text. You will also be required to access the Mastering Chemistry web site (www.masteringchemistry.com) in order to do your assigned homework.
- 4. Mastering Chemistry Homework: You will be assigned a set of homework for every chapter to be completed online at the Mastering Chemistry web site. The assignment for each chapter will be due by 11:59 pm two days after the completion of a chapter in lecture. A late penalty of 1% per day past the due date will be enforced. These assignments are invaluable in preparing you for the in-class exams. If you answer 70% of the assigned problems or more, you will get full credit. I strongly encourage you to solve as many problems as possible as working problems is the only practical way for learning the material, and you should try your best to solve the problems before looking at the solutions. The online homework will count for 10% of your overall course grade. Register at www.masteringchemistry.com with the course ID perry59824.

- **Group Work:** We will also have regular in-class group work and three in-class group assignments. Group work will count for 10% of your overall course grade.
- 6. Christian Practice: There ought to be something different about a course taken at PLNU when compared to an institution that is not faith based. This difference, at least for Chemistry, is not in content. It is, instead a difference in the class community. I desire for our class to be one in which the needs of others in the class are considered by the community. You will be assigned to a group at the beginning of the semester and you will be asked to pray for members of the group throughout the semester. You will meet as a group at least three times during the semester with the first meeting occurring in the first two weeks of class. You will be required to fill out a log that includes the times you met as a group, the times you have prayed for group members, as well as times that you have encouraged a classmate or helped them in some way. You will hand this log in at the end of the semester and will be required to have at least 10 entries total with entries from at least two of the three categories (prayer, encouragement, and help) in addition to the three group meetings. There will be two check-in assignments during the semester worth 10 points each. The final completed log will count for 70 points. In addition, you will be required to write a brief reflection on the overall assignment. This will also be worth 10 points. This Christian practice, love of neighbor, assignment will be worth 5% of your overall course grade.
- 7. Office Hours: I will make every effort to be available in my office during the times I've indicated below for office hours. You are welcome to take your chances and drop by, especially if you find these times inconvenient. I am also available outside of these times by appointment.

- **8.** <u>Help Sessions:</u> I will do my best to schedule some class time prior to each exam for me to answer any questions that you might have.
- 9. Quizzes: There will be three quizzes worth 20 points each given over the course of the semester. These quizzes can take on different forms, which may include but are not limited to the following: take home, inclass, in-class open book, or in-class group work. These quizzes will count for 6% of your overall course grade.

10. <u>Examinations</u>:

- a) Major Exams: Exams will cover material in the text and the lecture material as well as any other assigned material. There will be 3 major exams worth 100 points each. These will count for 39% of your overall course grade. There will be no exam scores dropped. Makeup examinations will be given only for excused absences provided the appropriate documentation is provided. You should make sure to contact me before your scheduled exam time. My phone (619-849-2976) has a 24-hour message service so you may leave a message (always leave a phone number where you may be reached). If you are unable to call me then have your roommate, parents, etc. make the contact for you. If you find that there are errors in the grading of your exam, you should come by my office as soon as possible.
- b) Final Exam: Successful completion of this class requires taking the final examination on its scheduled day and time (Friday, May 3 1:30-4 pm). The final examination schedule is posted on the Undergraduate Records site. If you find yourself scheduled for three (3) or more final examinations on the same day, you are authorized to contact each professor to arrange a different time for one of those exams. However, unless you have three (3) or more exams on the same day, no requests for alternative final examinations will be granted.

c) **Exam Schedule**: A tentative, but reasonably accurate, schedule for the 4 hour exams and final exam is given below. Changes in exam dates will be announced at least two days in advance. If you miss class and do not find out about the changes, that is your problem and it is not a valid reason for requesting a make-up exam. The date for the final exam is firm as set by University policy.
