Prerequisite. Completion or enrollment in CHE4070 is required.

Course Description

A 1-unit lab course designed to accompany <u>CHE 4070</u>. The lab component will focus primarily on detection of pollutants in air and water by using modern chemical instrumentation. The skills learned will be applied to a class research project.

Course Learning Outcomes

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

Analyze samples using standard chemical instrumentation (GC, HPLC, IR, UV-vis, ICP)
Design and conduct experiments related to environmental analysis
Analyze and interpret data from environmental analysis
Communicate technical information effectively

Lab Reports. Lab reports will be due for the each of the five instrument labs. These reports will focused on reporting and interpreting results.

Independent Project. The final project will require students to develop a proposal to use the instruments to analyze environmental samples that they collect. Once the proposal is approved, the students will prepare the samples and record the appropriate data. There will be one draft report and a final report due.

Recommended texts

There are no required textbooks for this course. The textbook required for CHE4068 will be a useful resource during this lab course.
