COURSE DESCRIPTION

ASSIGNMENTS AT-A-GLANCE

Participation (300 points): Each week, 20 points will be given for a combination of attendance, group participation and class discussion. Participation points will collectively make up 30% of the final grade.

Reading & Film Notes (250 points): Students will produce reading notes as they engage each chapter of Media Literacy in Action: Questioning the Media and Popular Culture: A User's Guide. Some weeks will include notes from viewing specific films. Completed submissions will be assessed for a total of 25% of the final grade.

Final Exam (100 points): The final exam will prompt students to respond to questions that take into account the content of the course including relevant examples from the lectures, in-class examples, readings and films. The final exam will be assessed for a total of 10% of the final grade.

Global News Analysis (100 points): Four analyses will be completed in response to global news coverage of particular stories. These analyses will be assessed for a total of 10% of the final grade.

Class Discussion Paper (100 points): Students will work in teams to produce a written paper that summarizes the important details of an assigned text including critical assessment of key themes, and guide the class in discussion. The written paper and class discussion will be assessed for a total of 10% of the final grade.

Reflection Papers (100 points): Every two weeks, students will write a reflection on a topic of interest from materia covered in readings, assignments and class sessions from the previous two weeks. These eight reflections will be assessed for a collective total of 10% of the final grade.

Author Presentation (50 points): Students will present on featured authors from chapters in Media Literacy in Action: Questioning the Media. Presentations will be assessed for a total of 5% of the final grade.
