COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an introduction to foundational theories and problems in moral philosophy and explores a process for ethical decision-making in order to develop a stakeholder approach to leadership in organizations. Emphasis will be given to the study of major Western ethical theories and important moral philosophers, and to creating a framework for evaluating ethical choices and applying that framework to ethical dilemmas in organizations.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Exhibit an understanding of foundational theories and problems in ethics (PLO 1 & 4)
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of ethical decision making (PLO 4).
- 3. Analyze organizational scenarios using ethical theories and models (PLO 2 & 4).
- 4. Evaluate leadership and ethics in an organizational setting (PLO 4).

COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 2 unit class delivered over 8 weeks. It is anticipated that students will spend a minimum of 37.5 participation hours per credit hour on their coursework. For this course, students will spend an estimated 75 total hours meeting the course learning outcomes. The time estimations are provided in the Canvas modules.
