COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an understanding of the critical role of leaders in fostering a creative work environment to support innovation. Topics include developing innovative solutions, building an innovative culture, becoming a learning organization, and developing innovation capacity and capability. An emphasis is placed on driving organizational innovation.

COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of leading innovation in business and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.

TRIGGER WARNING

I acknowledge that each of you comes to PLNU with your own unique life experiences. This contributes to the way you perceive several types of information. In *Leading Innovation*, we will cover a variety of topics, some of which you may find triggering. These topics include currently unknown innovative exploration and previously untried processes that may lead to innovative solutions. Each time these topics appear in a reading or unit, it is marked on the syllabus. The experience of being triggered versus intellectually challenged are different. The main difference is that an individual must have experienced trauma to experience being triggered, whereas an intellectual challenge has nothing to do with trauma. If you are a trauma survivor and encounter a topic in this class that is triggering for you, you may feel overwhelmed or panicked and find it difficult to concentrate. In response, I encourage you to take the necessary steps for your emotional safety. This may include leaving class while the topic is discussed or talking to a therapist at the Counseling Center. Should you choose to sit out on discussion of a certain topic, know that you are still responsible for the material; but we can discuss if there are other methods for accessing that material, and for assessing your learning on that material. Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of leading innovation in business and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.

COURSE MODALITY DEFINITIONS

Face-to-Face BBA/BAOL Courses:

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. Therefore, regular attendance and participation in each course are minimal requirements.
