COURSE MODALITY DEFINITIONS

Weekly Case Studies. Each class, students will read the case study posted in Canvas and come to class prepared to discuss case and answer related questions

Weekly Individual Assignment. Each week, students will be given an opportunity to reflect on that weeks work and a self care activity. Students will be given the chance to experiment with this experiential learning and consider connections to discussions, group issues, personal challenges as well as solutions and direction that can emerge from the practice of mindfulness. Up to 40 points for a written response that demonstrates engagement, reflection and openness to learning and development.
