Foundational Explorations Mission

PLNU provides a foundational course of study in the liberal arts informed by the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In keeping with the Wesleyan tradition, the curriculum equips students with a broad range of knowledge and skills within and across disciplines to enrich major study, lifelong learning, and vocational service as Christ-like participants in the world's diverse societies and cultures.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

History 1010 is the survey of the history of world societies from prehistory to 1500 A.D. This course will concentrate on the world's major societies and will offer an integrated introduction to their political, social, economic, and cultural development. The course challenges students to think, to analyze factors that caused change, to trace long-term trends in social, political, and economic life, to explain why events turned as they did, and to evaluate conflicting interpretations of facts. Students are challenged to relate the past to the present.

INCOMPLETES AND LATE ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments are to be submitted/turned in by the beginning of the class session when they are due—including assignments posted in Canvas. Incompletes will only be assigned in extremely unusual circumstances.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

Student grades will be posted in the Canvas gradebook no later than midnight on Tuesday of each week beginning in Week Two of this course. Final grades will be posted within ten days of the end of the class. Multiple measures of evaluation are used in the course, allowing students opportunities to demonstrate their learning in more than one way, and giving consideration to individual learning styles. Course components that will be evaluated include:

Discussions

Each week students will participate in online discussions with classmates that are related to the week's readings. These discussions replace the interactive dialogue that occurs in the traditional classroom setting. **Discussions represent 13% of the overall course grade.**

Guided Reading Exercise (GRE)

Reflective exercises and essays are due throughout the online portion of this course. The purpose of this assignment is to help you keep track of how historical events are portrayed in your textbook and to help you prepare for the class. You are to answer and write essays analyzing each chapter reading from your textbook and submit them through Canvas. Each essay should be at least one page in length (double-spaced). This assignment **represents 13% of the overall course grade.**

Reading Assignments

There are reading assignments from your LaunchPad textbook. These assignments must reflect college-level writing and critical thinking. You are required to 1) read an ebook and add a highlight or note in your ebook, 2) answer questions and take quizzes from primary document readings (Thinking like a Historian, Individuals in Society, and Analyzing the Evidence), and 3) take Learning Curve quizzes. These **Assignments represent 28% of the overall course grade.**

Group Project

The purpose of the assignment is to make the student research, analyze, and explain the historical significance of various topics through references from the main reading assignment, *Judge Dee*. **The Group Project represents 14% of the overall course grade.**

Summative Quizzes

14 summative quizzes will be presented during the semester. Each quiz consists of multiple-choice questions based mostly upon the readings from the assigned reading

from the textbook (Achieve). The Summative Quizzes represent 32% of the overall course grade.

Final Examination Policy €

Successful completion of this class requires taking the final examination on its scheduled day. If you find yourself scheduled for three (3) or more final examinations on the same day, you are authorized to contact each professor to arrange a different time for one of those exams. However, unless you have three (3) or more exams on the same day, no requests for alternative final examinations will be granted.

Students must complete the required program hours in the major (program) from Point Loma Nazarene University with a minimum grade of "C" in each course and an overall 2.00 grade point average.
