COURSE DESCRIPTION

Lit 5090/6090 is an advanced literature course: period and topic of study selected by the faculty member. This semester we will be reading the novels, short stories, essays, and letter of Flannery O'Connor.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the Conclusion of the Course Students will be able to:

- 1. Closely read and critically analyze texts in their original languages and/or in translation.
- 2. Recall, identify, and use fundamental concepts of literary study to read and discuss texts
 - a. Standard literary terminology
 - b. Modes/genres of literature
 - c. Elements of literary genres
 - d. Literary periods (dates, writers, characteristics, and important developments)
 - e. Contemporary critical approaches
 - f. Extra-literary research
- 3. Analyze the social, cultural, ethnic, gendered, and/or historical contexts of the works and their authors, and connect the texts with their own lives.
- 4. Create detailed and informed textual analysis of literary works that examine several of the fundamental concepts of literary study.

COURSE REQUIRMENTS

- *Reading*: Dates for the readings are clearly indicated on the schedule. Read daily if possible and complete all reading on time.
- *Discussion*: The success of the course will be directly related to the quality of weekly discussions. Each of you must feel comfortable contributing to discussions. And each of you should bring any questions you have about the reading to our attention during the course of our discussions.
- *Writing*: Students will complete five pieces of writing: 3-4 page reflections on each of the two novels, a 2-3 page reflection on a selected essay, a 7-10 page research-based paper on a selected short story, and a final exam.
- *Seminar Leadership*: In addition to regular participation in the weekly seminar, students will lead the conversation regarding the short story they have selected for the research-based essay.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

Your final grade will be determined as follows:

Your work will not be graded on a curve. A traditional scale will be used. Those who earn more than 90% of the possible points earn an A, those who earn between 80-89% of the points earn a B, and so on.

A indicates exceptional work (roughly 20% of students normally achieve this level)

- B indicates superior work (roughly 30% of students normally achieve this level)
- C indicates average work
- D indicates passing work
- F indicates unsatisfactory work
