# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

MTH 1013 - College Algebra (3)

A review and extension of elementary algebra, solutions of linear and quadratic equations, radicals, inequalities, linear and quadratic functions, polynomial functions, exponential and logarithmic functions, conic sections, sequences and series and graphing.

Prerequisite(s): MTH 0099 (or equivalent).

### **COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES**

The following student learning outcomes will be met in this course:

- 1. Students will be able to solve problems using linear equations, inequalities, graphs, and functions.
- 2. Students will be able to solve systems of linear equations.
- 3. Students will be able to solve problems using polynomials and factoring.
- 4. Students will be able to solve problems using logarithms.

Assessment method: Homework and exams.

- **Homework**: You may work with other people on your homework, but each individual will be responsible for writing up the entire homework assignment and turning it in. The homework is due at the start of class on Thursday.
- Examinations and the Final Examination. Examinations and the Final Examination will include problems and questions over material assigned in the text, readings and handouts, as well as material presented in class. No examination shall be missed without prior consent or a well-documented emergency beyond your control. In that case, the make-up exam will take place at 8:30 AM on the Saturday before final exams (April 27, 2024). A score of zero will be assigned for an examination that is missed without prior consent or a well-documented emergency beyond your control.
- Final Examination Policy. Successful completion of this class requires taking the cumulative final examination on its scheduled day. The final examination schedule is posted on the <u>Class Schedules</u> site. If you find yourself scheduled for three (3) or more final examinations on the same day, you are authorized to contact each professor to arrange a different time for one of those exams. However, unless you have three (3) or more exams on the same day, no requests for alternative final examinations will be granted.
