COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of the theories and methods of social interactions in the development of personal and group behavior. Topics include attitudes, communication, pro-social, and anti-social behaviors.

Social psychologists study individuals in context. In this course, you will learn theories of social psychology and how social psychologists study individuals, contexts, and their interactions. You will learn how to think like a social psychological scientist and how to identify social psychological principles at play in everyday life. We will discuss topics including how people think about the self and others, how humans are influenced by others, why people are unkind and prejudiced, as well as why people can be helpful and well-liked. You will also have the opportunity to read empirical research. I hope your learning in this class will further your personal and professional goals!

REQUIRED TECHNOLOGY

Reading Checks (quizzes), Learning Demonstrations (exams) and Assignments will be submitted through Canvas, so each student will need access to a computer. Students can utilize computers in the library for assignments; paper versions of in-class exams will be provided upon request.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Article Discussion (20% of final grade). Throughout the course, there will be thought-provoking empirical articles assigned. You will need to closely read the article and provide a written response. Your goal is to show mastery of the reading, critically evaluate the research, and begin thinking like a social psychologist. The assignment will also serve as a jumping off point for in-class discussion. See Canvas assignment for full instructions and rubric.

In-Class Activities and Applications (10% of final grade). We will engage in activities and discussion in class throughout the semester. Some activities will have a short accompanying assignment that will be completed in class. These assignments will vary, but will primarily focus on application of concepts. You will be graded on the extent to which you participate in and complete course activities and the accompanying assignment. Assignments should demonstrate meaningful application, reflection, and evaluation of concepts. Further instructions and expectations will be provided with each assignment. To account for potential absences from class, each student will submit 10 of their choice over the course of the semester (~13 total will be offered).

Chapter Learning Checks (20% of final grade). For this assignment, you will demonstrate your learning of each chapter by completing chapter quizzes on Canvas. You may use your notes and book. Questions will be from the current week's reading and also review questions from the previous week. Learning Checks will follow the assigned readings and will be due before class on the day that we are scheduled to begin discussing that chapter in class.

Learning Demonstrations (30% final grade). For your learning demonstrations (LDs), you will respond to questions that will require cumulative knowledge of social psychology. These questions will be short answer/essay questions in which you will need to express your learning using clear and precise language. The midterm and final LDs will be closed note/book, but you will have access to the questions beforehand. Successful completion of this course requires the on-time completion of the final exam on or before Friday, 5/3 at 1:30-4pm.

Faith Application Paper (20% of final grade). For this assignment, you will identify and discuss 4 social psychological concepts as they apply to your faith tradition, religious activities/beliefs, and/or spiritual journey. If you are not spiritual or religious, you may apply the concepts to an area of your life in which you find significant meaning and identify as sacred. See Canvas assignment for full instructions and rubric.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

Student grades will be posted in the Canvas grade book. It is important to read the comments posted in the grade book as these comments are intended to help students improve their work. Final grades will be posted within one week of the end of the class. Grades will be weighted as listed above and determined based on the following:

COURSE POLICIES AND EXPECTATIONS



General

- Any changes to the syllabus (including course expectations and assignments) are possible. Changes
 will be announced in class and/or as a Canvas announcement. Students are responsible for actively
 monitoring Canvas updates.
- Students are responsible for all content/material that is found within the Canvas course.
- Students should complete the assigned reading, lectures, or activities prior to class. Such practices will enable you fully participate in class activities.
- There is no extra credit. The existing assignments are meaningful opportunities to show how much you have learned and how much time you are dedicating to learning the material.
- No audio or video recordings of class are permitted without written consent of the instructor.
- As part of this course, we will discuss topics such as culture, social attitudes/perceptions, stereotypes, prejudice, discrimination, conflict, and aggression/violence. These topics may come up without warning (i.e., I will not give "trigger warnings" in class.). If you encounter a topic that is challenging for you, it can manifest in feelings of discomfort and upset. Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of social psychology, and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.
- When participating in class and completing assignments, students should be mindful to use
 appropriate language that is inclusive and prejudice free. Inclusive language is the standard outlined
 by the APA. Professional writing and speaking do not use unsubstantiated, irrelevant, or demeaning
 generalizations about personal qualities such as age, disability, economic class, ethnicity, marital
 status, parentage, political or religious beliefs, race, gender, sex, or sexual orientation.

Attendance

- Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. Attendance will be taken during class. Students who miss 15+ minutes of class may be counted absent. If the student is absent for more than 10% of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20%, the student may be deenrolled without notice until the university withdrawal date or, after that date, receive an "F" grade. See Academic Policies in the Undergraduate Academic Catalog. If absences exceed these limits but are due to university excused health issues, an exception will be granted.
- Out of respect and care for one another, please do not attend class if you are feeling ill in any way.
 You do not need to obtain a doctor's note or email the professor. You will not miss points for being absent (just follow overall attendance policy above).
- What if a student misses class for any reason?
 - You do not need to email me if you need to miss class. You should check the syllabus and course outline to see what will be missed. I do not send notes to students, Zoom students into class, nor record lectures.
 - If you miss class, you are responsible for obtaining [from a classmate] lecture material, class exercises, and all in-class announcements AND submit any assignments on time, if applications.
 Students may then see me during office hours to clarify any material as desired.

• What if a student misses the midterm learning demonstration (LD)?

• A make-up LD is available in cases of emergency or illness or if the student provides at least 2 weeks' notice of a non-emergency absence. The make-up LD must be taken within 2 weeks of the original test date and it is up to the student to contact the professor to schedule a time to take the LD in a proctored setting. There is no option to re-take a LD that was previously attempted.

• What if a student misses the final learning demonstration (final exam)?

- A make-up option is not available for the final exam. The on-time completion of the final exam is a
 requirement for this course. Missing the final exam will result in the student earning an F grade. A
 grade of "Incomplete" will only be offered in extremely rare and unusual circumstances and with
 the approval of the Vice Provost of Academic Administration.
- Students who arrive late to the final exam will not be admitted once one or more students have already completed their final exam and left the room. Some students finish their tests very quickly, so even being 15 minutes late may prevent you from being able to take the final exam. Make every effort to arrive on time. Students who begin their exams late will not be offered additional time to complete the exam.

Submitting Assignments and Late Work

- All due dates are posted in advance on Canvas. You may submit assignments early.
- Work submitted on Canvas must be in .doc, .docx, or .pdf file types only. The student is responsible for making sure Canvas files work and go through Turnitin. Files that do not open, are in the wrong file type, and/or can't go through Turnitin will be considered late until the problem is rectified.
- What if a student needs to turn in an assignment late? What if the file didn't upload correctly on Canvas and now it's late?
 - Late work is accepted for 10 days, including weekend days, after the original due date. Canvas will automatically deduct 10% from the grade for each late day. For example, an assignment submitted 3 days late can earn up to 70% of the available points. End-of-semester assignments may not be submitted late after the final exam (to accommodate faculty grading deadlines). In other words, no coursework will be accepted after Friday, May 3, 2024 at 1:30pm. Work submitted late may also be graded later.
 - Freebie students can exchange one no-questions-asked freebie to turn in one late assignment up to 10 days after initial deadline at no deduction. The assignment still needs to be completed, and it will be graded according to the same rubric, but it will not be considered late. The freebie does not apply to learning demonstrations. Note that no coursework, including freebie work, will be accepted after Friday, May 3, 2024 at 1:30pm.
 - To use your freebie, submit your late work on Canvas and include a Canvas submission comment saying that you are using the freebie (do not email the professor). The freebie must be used at the time of time of submitting the work, not retroactively.
