
# Course Syllabus

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

The University catalog describes this course as: Major counseling theories and techniques are examined and applied in the context of the helping relationship.

This course includes an overview of the historical relationship between religion and psychotherapy, differing models of the therapeutic relationship, and various models for integrating psychotherapeutic theory with theological issues. It introduces specific issues that arise in conducting therapy with religious persons, including criteria for evaluating healthy and unhealthy forms of religious belief.

The purpose of each class session is to highlight selected topics from the required readings and to supplement this material with related ideas. Students are responsible for all assigned readings, whether or not discussed in class. A "graduate style" discussion format will be used in the course. Each student is expected to have read the assigned reading for class discussion (course schedule below), and be prepared to think together about the reading in class.

#### **COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES**

After completing this course, you should be able to:

- 1. Students will describe, explain, and apply an understanding of counseling and psychotherapy theories and methods, and demonstrate effective practice of counseling/therapy skills.
- 2. Students will articulate and demonstrate counselor / psychotherapist characteristics and behaviors that influence helping processes.
- 3. Students will utilize counseling / therapy models to conceptualize client presentation in order to select the appropriate counseling interventions.
- 4. Students will gain an understanding of faith integration with the context of psychotherapy and counseling.

#### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

- 1. **Canvas Journal Questions (5-entries at 20-points each):** The course text and lecture materials have been supplemented with questions designed to personalize the material covered in class. It is expected that course material will be read <u>before</u> the scheduled lecture so that informed and lively discussion may be the primary focus of class meetings. Journal questions may also be utilized for class discussion, so please attempt to complete your thoughtful responses prior to class. Must be a minimum of 500-words.
- 2. **Interview Reflections** Through out the course there will be 5 in class interviews of clinicians representing various psychotherapeutic theories. Students will reflect on their experience of these interviews and the clinicians themselves. Must be a minimum of 500-words.
- 3. Theory Fair Presentation (125-points): Students will present on a counseling theories from the text.. Poster boards will include major contributors to the theory, major tenets of the theory, terminology, techniques, and interventions related to the theory. The presentation will include a recorded video demonstration of the theory (no longer than 3-5 minutes for role-play). The presentation must include a 1 page handout for each student in class. *The handout must be submitted via Canvas by 11:59 PM February 13th.* The late assignment policy will be enforced for presentations not submitted the day prior. Please refer to the "Student Presentation Rubric" for more specific requirements.
- 4. Theory Fair Personal Reflection (75-points) : Write a 3-4 page personal reflection on what you learned during the theory fair from the different presentations. Which presentation did you find most intriguing and could see yourself utilizing?Which presentation did you have the hardest time meshing with or understanding? How do you see your personality fitting into the various theories? As a future clinician, after learning about all the different theories, do you see yourself being a theoretical purist or being more eclectic?

#### 5. Attendance (5-points per class session) and Participation (5-points per class session):

Regular and punctual attendance at all classes is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent from more than 10 percent of class meetings, the faculty member can file a written report which may result in de- If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation. In the event of an officially excused absence on the due date of an assignment, the assignment will be due the next class time. All penalties for late assignments will then be assessed from that revised due date.

Class participation is necessary to demonstrate familiarity with the assignments and the ability to transfer theory into practice. The following criteria will be used to evaluate participation:

- Participation in discussions
- Appropriateness of comments
- · Comments useful for clarification or meaningful contribution to the class
- Willingness to participate in exercises and simulations
- Sensitivity to participation of others in the class; avoid dominating discussions
- Class participation demonstrates understanding of learned theory

## Late Policy

Assignments submitted up to 24 hours past the due date will be deducted 25% of the grade. Assignments submitted up to 48 hours past the due date will be deducted 50% of the grade. Any assignment turned in after 48 hours past the due date will receive no credit. Students are encouraged to alert the professor if an assignment is anticipated to be late. Professors can extend these late penalties if arrangements are made in advance.

#### 4. Participation
