COURSE DESCRIPTION

Supervised therapy experience that provides opportunity for a variety of counseling related activities in an off-campus setting. Off-campus and on-campus supervision will examine the student's ability to assess, diagnose, and treat individuals. The 300-hour practicum includes a minimum of 120 hour

direct, face-to-face service. You will be required to maintain a pace of required experience to complete 700 total hours in order to graduate.

INSTITUTIONAL LEARNING OUTCOMES (ILO)

- 1. Provide a brief written and verbal clinical assessment of a case along with a clinical hypothesis, treatment plan, identification of legal/ethical issues (including self of therapist issues) and collaboration with other professionals. (SLO 1)
- 2. Describe qualities related to an effective therapeutic relationship as they operate in a clinical case including spirituality. (SLO 2)
- 3. Reflect on changes to your thinking of how religious/spiritual/faith issues operate in your clinical work. (SLO 2)
- 4. Describe cultural factors that might be operating in a clinical case. (SLO 3)

You will be required to maintain a pace of required experience to complete 700 total hours in order to graduate.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Several of the requirements from this class along with projects in Clinical Practicum 1 and 3 will integrated into a *Clinical Portfolio project* which will be presented at the end of the program.



- 1. **Video Presentation.** Two videotapes of clinical work must be shown. Each video must be from different sessions and must correspond to the Case Summaries.
- 2. **Written Brief Case Presentation.** Students will need to provide a written transcript of a verbally delivered 12-minute Case Summary (see Rubric) which includes:
- Verbal reflection on your ability to establish and maintain a therapeutic relationship with your client during each case presentation.
- Verbal reflection on your awareness of some of the Cultural Humility factors (openness, respect, curiosity and accountability particular to often unrecognized social power) that might be operating in your clinical cases.
- Verbal reflection on how religious/spiritual/faith issues operate in your work
- 3. Written and Oral Reflection on PSY6001 paper. Turn in your PSY6001 integration paper along with a reflection on how your values in this paper fit or have changed with the clinical work you are currently providing (if you cannot find your paper, an alternative assignment will be given). Present orally in class about how you've grown in this area.
- 4. **Oral Presentation of Intervention.** Present an intervention that you've found helpful so that your peers can benefit from it too!
- 5. **Attendance and Participation:** Regular and punctual attendance at all classes is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent from more than 10 percent of class meetings, the faculty member can file a written report which may result in de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation.
