COURSE DESCRIPTION~ Welcome to the Elementary Spanish sequence. This course is one of the components of the General Education Program at Point Loma Nazarene University, under the category of Seeking Cultural Perspectives. By including this course in a common educational experience for undergraduates, the faculty supports the survey of human endeavors from a historical, cultural, linguistic, and philosophical perspective, including developing a critical appreciation of human expression--both artistic and literary. This course emphasizes four basic skills: aural comprehension, speaking, reading, and writing. Also noted is the cultural and historical background of the areas where the language is spoken. Participation and active use of the language is emphasized in the classroom.

1. Speak (application) at the mid to high novice level using (application) basic formulaic and memorized materials within the student's own experience. (PLO 3)

- 3. Write (application, knowledge) discrete sentences as well as simple connected paragraphs using memorized vocabulary and grammar structures. (PLO 1,5)
- 4. Read (application) cultural texts that employ familiar vocabulary and cognates as well as learned grammatical structures. (**PLO 4**)
- 5. Demonstrate (application, knowledge) comprehension of basic cultural mores and patterns of living of the target culture(s) studied. (PLO 4,6)

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

<u>Quizzes</u>: Every week or week and a half you will have a vocabulary quiz to measure your studying and learning. <u>Quizzes represent 10% of the overall course grade</u>.

Exams: There will be 6 exams, one for each lesson covered. Exams represent 35% of the overall course grade.

Final Exam: 10% of the final grade.

<u>Cultural Engagement Assignment</u>: Students will be required to complete **five cultural engagement assignments** during the class, such as watching a documentary or a movie, visiting a museum, and attending a lecture. The professor will provide more in formation. **Cultural Engagement Assignment represents 20% of the overall course grade.**

VHL Portales Assignments: Online homework represents 15% of the overall course grade.

The decision to include such material is not taken lightly. These topics may include racism, colonization, sexism, immigration, genocide, etc. If you encounter a topic that is intellectually challenging for you, it can manifest in feelings of discomfort and upset. In response, I encourage you to come talk to me or your friends or family about it. Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in Spanish culture and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.

TRIGGER WARNING~ I acknowledge that each of you comes to PLNU with your own unique life experiences. This contributes to the way you perceive several types of information. In Spanish 1001, we will cover a variety of topics, some of which you may find triggering. These topics include racism, colonization, sexism, immigration, genocide, etc. Each time this topic appears in a reading or unit, it is marked on the syllabus. The experience of being triggered versus intellectually challenged are different. The main difference is that an individual must have experienced trauma to experience being triggered, whereas an intellectual challenge has nothing to do with trauma. If you are a trauma survivor and encounter a topic in this class that is triggering for you, you may feel overwhelmed or panicked and find it difficult to concentrate. In response, I encourage you to take the necessary steps for your emotional safety. This may include leaving class while the topic is discussed or talking to a therapist at the Counseling Center. Should you choose to sit out on discussion of a certain topic, know that you are still responsible for the material; but we can discuss if there are other methods for accessing that material, and for assessing your learning on that material. Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of Spanish language and culture and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.
