**Catalog Entry**: Advanced instruction and guided workshop in writing poetry. Attention is also given to methodology in teaching poetry writing and to finding publication.

**Course Description:** This graduate-level poetry workshop will focus on the art of the line, giving special attention to the art of line breaks in free verse and to the boundary between poetry and prose. We will read and discuss craft writing as well as published poetry collections (with occasional visits from the authors!). You will write and revise poems throughout the semester, and we will spend a good amount of time in workshop, discussing new poems by writers in our class and giving each writer feedback for revision.

#### **Course Learning Outcomes**

- 1. identify advanced aspects of theory, style, and structure in works of poetry;
- 2. analyze poetry written by professionals and peers to determine authors' writing

techniques in relationship to target audiences and genre conventions;

3. employ advanced research techniques as necessary to meet the demands of poetic craft and content;

4. craft poems using advanced techniques specific to genre to create descriptive and evocative language;

5. apply advanced workshop techniques for constructive criticism of peers and in turn take criticism and use it to improve their own work;

6. format texts in a genre-appropriate and professional manner for submission to workshop and publication;

7. present written work to live audiences, demonstrating advanced strategies for audience engagement and oral communication.

<u>Attendance & Participation</u>: Because we meet once a week and this course's work is heavily based on collaboration, attendance and participation are enormously important. Please do all that you can to be present and on time. We will take a break together mid-class.

According to PLNU's policy: if a student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university withdrawal date or, after that date, receive an "F" grade.

<u>Craft Talk</u>: On your assigned day, please come to class prepared to teach us about an element of poetic craft. (You'll sign up for a topic in advance). Your talk will include both a craft lesson and a writing exercise, and the entire presentation (including the exercise) should run between 10-15 minutes. A little practice in advance goes a long way. This presentation should be concise, well-prepared, and *engaging*. Use of media is welcome but not required.

<u>Post-AWP Mini-Presentation</u>: The Monday after the AWP Conference, you will share something you gleaned from an AWP panel or from your alternative assignment. This presentation need not be formal, but it should be concise (think 2-3 minutes) and *engaging*. Use of media is welcome but not required. This will be part of your A&D grade.

<u>Poems</u>: You will turn in several early drafts of poems. You will get some prompts in class from me and from each other to help you get ideas, but these will ultimately be self-assigned. Please follow the Canvas modules closely and submit pieces on the day they are due. These early drafts need not be masterpieces, but they should not be sloppy. It should be clear that you worked on them.

<u>Workshops</u>: We will do on-the-spot workshops as a whole class throughout the semester. Each week, you will post your poem for workshop on Canvas (please use .doc file format) the Friday before class. The poems will be available for you to read before class if you wish, but we will be reading them and discussing them together during class time, so preparation beforehand is not required. For each workshop, you will be responsible for bringing hard copies of your own poem equal to the number of people in the room so that we can mark them up together as we talk. During workshops, we will thoroughly discuss the writing to give the authors a chance to see how readers are experiencing their work and to give some feedback for revision. Your workshop grade will be based on both your verbal participation and active written comments.

<u>Final Portfolio</u>: You will draft 10 new poems throughout the semester. Your final portfolio should include a brief (1-2 page) introduction to your work that especially reflects on your engagement with the concept of "the line," 10 well-revised poems, and a brief statement (footnote or endnote) for *each* poem on why/how you began, revised, and settled it.

<u>Paper Format</u>: All assignments, unless otherwise instructed, must be typed, in 12-point Times or Arial font, with one-inch margins. Poems should usually be single spaced or spaced according to the design of the author. Prose should be double spaced and include a word count in the upper right corner. Please submit electronic copies in the appropriate place on Canvas as instructed for each assignment.

<u>PLNU Email</u>: Your PLNU email account should be checked often. This is the way that I will most frequently communicate with you outside of class, and it's also the way the university distributes important information.

*Note*: For our class's purposes, writing is collaborative, and writers share and borrow from each other all the time. There are ways to do this that are acceptable (such as taking suggestions from professors and peers), but there are also ways to use other people's ideas or words in a way that is considered plagiarism (such as passing off somebody else's work as your own). We will discuss this further in class.

## Artificial Intelligence (AI) Policy

Most publications do not currently allow use of AI in submitted works. Most of the current AI tools (e.g, ChatGPT, iA Writer, Marmot, Botowski) encourage people to outsource deep thinking and critical thought in favor of quick idea generation and bland text, and the results are too often factually incorrect anyway. Because of this, and due to the fact that using ideas and language that are not your own is a form of plagiarism, these AI tools are not permitted for our class assignments. If you've got an incredibly compelling reason to use one, please seek approval in advance from me and cite the AI tool appropriately. Any unapproved usage of these tools will be treated as plagiarism. Putting another person's writing into an AI tool (a.k.a. handing over

another person's intellectual property without permission) is a serious offense and will result in an F in this course.

## **PLNU Academic Accommodations Policy**
