- 4. Analyze similar trends across cultures.
- 5. Compare and contrast the past with current events, issues, and problems.

# **Content Warning**

I acknowledge that each of you comes to PLNU with your own unique life experiences. This contributes to the way you perceive various types of information. In World Civilizations all of the class content, including that which may be intellectually or emotionally challenging, has been intentionally curated to achieve the learning goals for this course. The decision to include such material is not taken lightly. These topics include war, destruction, abuse, and genocide. If you encounter a topic that is intellectually challenging for you, it can manifest in feelings of discomfort and upset. In response, I encourage you to come talk to me or your friends or family about it. Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of History and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.

### **Trigger Warning**

I acknowledge that each of you comes to PLNU with your own unique life experiences. This contributes to the way you perceive several types of information. In World Civilizations we will cover a variety of topics, some of which you may find triggering. These topics include war, Destruction, abuse, and genocide. Each time this topic appears in a reading or unit, it is marked on the syllabus. The experience of being triggered versus intellectually challenged are different. The main difference is that an individual must have experienced trauma to experience being triggered, whereas an intellectual challenge has nothing to do with trauma. If you are a trauma survivor and encounter a topic in this class that is triggering for you, you may feel overwhelmed or panicked and find it difficult to concentrate. In response, I encourage you to take the necessary steps for your emotional safety. This may include leaving class while the topic is discussed or talking to a therapist at the Counseling Center. Should you choose to sit out on discussion of a certain topic, know that you are still responsible for the material; but we can discuss if there are other methods for accessing that material, and for assessing your learning on that material. Class topics are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of history, and I will support you throughout your learning in this course.

### **Incompletes and Late Assignments**

All assignments are to be submitted/turned in by the beginning of the class session when they are due— including assignments posted in Canvas. I will accept late assignment for partial credit. Partial credit begins at a 75%.

Incompletes will only be assigned in extremely unusual circumstances.

## **PLNU Course Modality Definitions**

- **1.** Online Courses: These are courses with class meetings where all instruction and interaction is fully online.
  - a. Synchronous Courses: At least one class meeting takes place at a designated time.
  - **b.** Asynchronous Courses: All class meetings are asynchronous.
- **2.** Hybrid Courses: These are courses with class meetings that take place both in the classroom and online synchronously and/or asynchronously.
- 3. In-Person Courses: These are courses that meet in person with the instructor and students in a

physical classroom setting. With approval by the area dean, this may include up to 25% of qualified class interactions through a Learning Management System (such as Canvas).

In some courses, a portion of the credit hour content will be delivered asynchronously and attendance will be determined by submitting the assignments by the posted due dates. See <u>Academic Policies</u> in the Undergraduate Academic Catalog.

## **Asynchronous Attendance/Participation Definition**

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A day of attendance in asynchronous content is determined as contributing a substantive note, assignment, discussion, or submission by the posted due date. Failure to meet these standards will result in an absence for that day. Instructors will determine how many asynchronous attendance days are required each week.

# **Assignments At-A-Glance**

Grades will be based on a weighting scale for the following assignments:

- Interactive Lessons (15% of total course points). Each week you will complete at least 2 guided lessons composed of text, video, multiple-choice questions, and short essay questions. These lessons are designed to help you navigate the readings.
- Discussions (20% of total course points). Each week you will complete one discussion open to the whole class. Before participating in the discussion you should ensure that you have completed all the readings and viewings for the week so that you can

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provide an informed initial post. You will then respond to other peers as indicated in the discussion prompt.

- Group Activities (20% of total course points). Each week you will complete one activity with a partner or a small group. Before participating in the activity you should ensure that you have completed all the readings and viewings for the week.
- Presentation (20% of total course points). During the penultimate week of the course, you will create a presentation for your peers about a historical topic. Final Exam (25% of total course points). During the last week of the course, you will take a final exam with online proctoring that will test your proficiency with knowledge gained throughout the entire course.
- Surveys. Throughout the course, you will be prompted to complete an academic honesty statement, a state authorization form, a midcourse survey, and a final course evaluation. While you will not receive points for completing these surveys, they are required in order for you to progress through the course.

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
