Course Description: This course surveys general organizational leadership principles and their application to the organization and administration of the health/fitness, coaching and physical education professions. Emphasis is on business management principles and operational concepts, including organizational structure, facility management, industry

standards and guidelines, personnel management practices, and personal developmental leadership concepts.

Course Objectives: To investigate different practices and theories of leadership and management. To provide an opportunity to discuss and process leadership concepts both personal and administrative. This course will rely mostly on reading, writing, discussions and lectures.

Course Learning/Foundational Exploration Outcomes:

- **a.** Articulate theories of administrative and personal/developmental Leadership.
- **b.** List traits and behaviors that influence leadership capability.
- c. Recognize and act upon opportunities for Leadership.
- **d.** To develop sensitivity to dilemmas in Leadership situations.
- e. To assist in developing deeper levels of interpersonal skills in and for leadership.
- **f.** To assist developing ways of thinking about yourself as a Leader.

Course Spirit: The nature of this class will allow us to discuss openly and freely the complexities of Leadership issues and Leadership principles. This is intended to be a safe place and environment to have open discussions that will challenge us to develop as leaders administratively and personally. Professor and students alike must respect and honor one another

Assignments/Expectations:

- 1. **PRESENTATION**: Each student will give a 10-15-minute Power Point presentation on any leadership principle Administrative or Personal discussed this semester in class. You are free to share and be creative with your time in any way you would like. It must be a Leadership principle(s) that have had the most impact on you positively or negatively, or both. You can pick one area of Leadership or multiple. There is freedom in this exercise...don't give your freedom away. Be creative, thoughtful, and take advantage of it. This will be presented at the end of the semester.
- 2. **READING, WRITTEN PAPER AND ZOOM DISCUSSION:** There will be 5 reading assignments (see semester schedule below). Each reading assignment will require a written response. We will then discuss the written response together.
- 3. **ATTENDANCE:** A major piece of Leadership is showing up. Professor and student will have 5 assigned or more if agreed upon zoom meetings (see semester schedule below) during the semester.
- 4. **FINAL EXAM:** You will take a test at the end of the semester. I will have a thorough study guide to assist you.
