### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

An advanced study of representative works of world cinema. Class inquiry focuses on film narrative, art, and theory. Includes a variety of eras and genres, placing the works within their cultural contexts.

# COURSE CREDIT HOUR INFORMATION

In the interest of providing sufficient time to accomplish the stated Course Learning Outcomes, this class meets the PLNU credit hour policy for a 3 unit class delivered over 5 weeks. It is anticipated that students will spend a minimum of 37.5 participation hours per credit hour on their coursework. For this course, students will spend an estimated 112.5 total hours meeting the course learning outcomes. The time estimations are provided in the Canvas modules.

# ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

#### NO LATE WORK and NO EXTRA CREDIT.

This course uses weighted grades, meaning each category of assignments will comprise a certain percentage of the total grade for the course.

- Participation (11% of total) Active participation is expected in this course. After watching each film in the course, students will participate in an asynchronous discussion of the film.
- Writing Assignment (14% of total) In Week 1, students will complete a writing assignment in which they apply concepts learned from the required reading.
- Film Reviews (30% of total) Students will complete a film review (template provided) for each film they view in the course.
- Quizzes (15% of total) Students will complete several quizzes designed to assess the application of knowledge from required readings in the course.
- **Final Paper** (30% of total) Students will write a final paper in which they apply all concepts learned in the course to analyze a chosen film.

### TRIGGER WARNING

I acknowledge that each of you comes to PLNU with your own unique life experiences. This contributes to the way you perceive several types of information. In Diverse Voices of Cinema, we will cover a variety of topics, some of which you may find triggering. These topics include different religious beliefs, political views, sexual scenes, gender challenges, mild violence, smoking, the use of explicit language, scenes of poverty, and decadence. Each time this topic appears in a reading or unit, it is marked on the syllabus. The experience of being triggered versus intellectually challenged are different. The main difference is that an individual must have experienced trauma to experience being triggered, whereas an intellectual challenge has nothing to do with trauma. If you are a trauma survivor and encounter a topic in this class that is triggering for you, you may feel overwhelmed or panicked and find it difficult to concentrate. In response, I encourage you to take the necessary steps for your emotional safety. This may include leaving class while the topic is discussed or talking to a therapist at the Counseling Center. Should you choose to sit out on a discussion of a certain topic, know that you are still responsible for the material; but we can discuss if there are other methods for accessing that material, and for assessing your learning on that material. Class topics

are discussed for the sole purpose of expanding your intellectual engagement in the area of [subject/major], and I will support you
