COURSE DESCRIPTION

Supervised therapy experience in applied psychotherapeutic techniques at an external agency. This course provides support, supervision, and consultation for students' training at their practicum site. A total of 700 hours, 300 of which are face-to-face direct service, must be accrued throughout the practicum course sequence. Students must be training at an approved site to be enrolled in this course. Credit/No Credit.

- 4. Identify cultural factors that might be operating in the presented clinical case, including how these factors influence their professional work. (SLO 3)

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Besides attendance, the capstone project for this class will be a *Clinical Portfolio* at the end of the class.

1. Attendance and Participation

We will conduct regular supervision and meet during the assigned two-hour time frame. Regular and punctual attendance at all classes is considered essential to your growth and development as a therapist. This class is designed to support you in your external training, provide important supervision of cases, and punctuate your various classroom learning experiences through a cumulative clinical portfolio. Please do your best to attend each meeting.

Class participation is necessary to demonstrate your clinical competence and the ability to transfer theory into practice. The following criteria will be used to evaluate participation:

- Participation in discussions
- Appropriateness of comments
- · Comments useful for clarification or meaningful contribution to the class
- Willingness to participate in exercises and simulations
- Sensitivity to participation of others in the class; avoid dominating discussions
- · Class participation demonstrates understanding of learned theory

2. Video Presentations

Students will be required to show two video recordings of a session during the term. The videos should include a demonstration of an intervention that is informed by a theoretical orientation. Note: Students may use the 12-min case summary in their presentation of the clip if they wish. If the formal 12-min case summary write-up was not completed in PSY6096, it can be done this term.

3. Clinical Portfolio

As a part of the Supervised Clinical Practicum sequence (PSY 6095-6097) and with the Student Learning Outcomes in mind, students will present a written CLINICAL PORTFOLIO that will be built throughout the MACC program. The Clinical Portfolio will include:
