- 3. Appraise the significance of scientific theories for Christian theology.

the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive an "F" grade.

COURSE MODALITY DEFINITIONS

- 1. **In-Person:** Course meetings are face-to-face with no more than 25% online delivery.
- 2. **Online:** Coursework is completed 100% online and asynchronously.
- 3. **Online Synchronous:** Coursework is completed 100% online with required weekly online class meetings.
- 4. **Hybrid:** Courses that meet face-to-face with required online components.
