COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides a review of the accounting reporting process with an in-depth study of generally accepted accounting principles as they relate to assets and their related income statement accounts. Topics also include time value concepts and the recognition of revenue.

- 2. Explain the important elements and basic reporting issues of financial statements, particularly as they relate to assets and their related income statement accounts (PLO 1, A1, A3, AC1 & AC3).
- 3. Analyze transactions in accordance with GAAP to determine the proper accounting treatment (PLO A1, A3, AC1 & AC3).
- 4. Prepare a Balance Sheet and Income Statement in accordance with GAAP (PLO A1, A3, AC1 & AC3).
- 5. Evaluate financial performance and business-related issues using accounting information, time value of money concepts and key financial ratios (PLO A1, A3, AC1 & AC3).
- 6. Analyze accounting decisions based upon ethical values (PLO 4).

Midterms & Final Exam: The exams may include Multiple-Choice or Problems based on text material, class discussions, and homework assignments. The final exam will be comprehensive. No makeup exams will be given without prior permission. Students should bring standard calculators, pencils, and an eraser to all exams.

Homework: Homework assignments consist of questions and problems from the end of each chapter. Submit only your own original work for homework. Homework will be completed and submitted through the CengageNOWv2 website. Assignments will receive a 10% increase in grade when transferred to Canvas. Late homework assignments will receive 50% credit, but no homework will be accepted after the exam on the chapter material.

Reading Questions: Rather than taking a quiz before we discuss each chapter in class, you will be given a set of reading questions to respond to and submit via file upload in Canvas for each chapter. Each chapter's reading questions will be worth 10 points. The objective is to encourage you to read the chapters before they are discussed in class as well as to help build out your notes for each chapter. The questions have been chosen intentionally to help you think through the major issues in each chapter and to help you prepare for the class discussion that will occur in the chapter.

Unit Assignments: Five times throughout the course you will be assigned either a research or writing assignment that will require you to use tools available to you to either answer a research question, look into and analyze an aspect of a company's financial statement, or communicate research in written form. The goal of these unit assignments is to help you move beyond the problems worked and actually apply that material to a "real-world" scenario. This will also give you a glimpse into one aspect of an accountant in any industry's job.

Chapters 1, 2, and 3 Review Assignment: The first three chapters are a review of what you learned in ACC 2001. As a result, rather than reviewing those chapters in detail, you will work through an assignment that reminds you of the concepts you learned and allows you to practice and refresh your memory.

Stukent Financial Accounting Simternship: Stukent's Financial Accounting: Accounting Cycle Simternship places you in a real-life business scenario to help you review and better understand foundational financial accounting knowledge. In this Simternship, you will perform job-related tasks in a real-world setting for a powerful learning experience. There are 11 rounds in the Simternship. Each round is worth 10 points. The Simternship will automatically grade each round.

Class Participation & Attendance: I expect you to come to class prepared to answer questions and participate in group activities and other in-class assignments. **Attendance at all class sessions is mandatory. Be on time for class.** Punctuality is an important attribute in any successful business endeavor. If you are late two times, it will be counted as one absence. There are approximately 3 points available for each class. Students who have an unexcused absence will not receive any points for that day. Students who are late for class will automatically lose half the available points for that day. Students may be excused from class for inappropriate computer/cell phone usage, and the class will be counted as an unexcused absence for grading purposes.
