COURSE DESCRIPTION

ART1003 Two-Dimensional Design is an introductory design course. It is intended to provide the students with a critical awareness of the elements and principles of design as well as other formal aspects of design criticism and theory. Emphasis is placed on the practical ability to transform design concepts into handmade two-dimensional artworks.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of the course students will be able to...

- Develop critical thinking, problem solving, and knowledge through the completion of assignments and artworks created in class.
- Acquire technical skills and craftsmanship through the use of various two-dimensional art materials and processes including painting, drawing, masking, gluing, and cutting.
- Demonstrate the elements & principles of design through written, oral, and 2-dimensional art forms.
- Participate in the evaluation of presented artworks through both individual and collective critique.

METHODS

Instruction will be given through: class lectures, demonstrations, small group discussions, one-on-one discussion with the instructor, videos on professional artists, hands on projects, class critiques, and peer reviews.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance at all class sessions is required. Attendance in class means that you are prepared for class with all necessary materials, and actively engaged with the discussions or working on your project during the entire class period. Exceptions to the attendance policy will be made on a case by case basis, please communicate with me via email in advance of absences. Excessive absences may result in you being dropped from the course.

Regular and punctual attendance at all class sessions is considered essential to optimum academic achievement. If the student is absent for more than 10 percent of class sessions, the faculty member will issue a written warning of de-enrollment. If the absences exceed 20 percent, the student may be de-enrolled without notice until the university drop date or, after that date, receive the appropriate grade for their work and participation.

- Missing four classes will result in your final grade being reduced by one letter grade.
- Missing five classes will result in your grade being reduced by two letter grades.
- Missing six classes will result in failure of the class.
- Coming to class late three times is equivalent to one absence.
- If you need to miss class because you are sick or have an emergency, please communicate this with me via email.

STUDIO POLICIES

Clean up: Keeping the studio space clean and organized is vital to ensuring a safe and productive work environment for everyone. At the end of each class session, and at the end of any work session in the studio, all materials must be stored and put back. *Leave the studio space cleaner than how you found it.* Desks should be cleaned and whipped down if needed, all scraps thrown away in the trash. Do not directly cut with an X-acto knife on desks without placing a cutting mat first.

STUDENT CONDUCT

- NO headphones/air pods are allowed to be worn during class lecturers or demos.
- Cell phones should be on silent and refrained from using during class.
- Arrive on time and be prepared to participate in all class activities, projects, discussions, and critiques. Each student is expected to contribute to the discussion.
- Bring all necessary tools and supplies, this means having them with you at the start of class. Coming to class unprepared is the same as an absence.
- Students should expect to spend time outside of studio work days to complete drawings.
- To get a grade, submit a photo of your coursework to the Canvas assignment by the due date.
- Your work may be photographed/documented for educational purposes.
- Studio work days are not optional and attendance is necessary. This is a studio course which means you will be spending time working on your projects during the allotted class time.

GRADING

There will be five main *projects* during the course of the semester. Each project will have a grading rubric and a group *critique*, these serve as the "tests" of our class. The primary purpose

of critique is to practice utilizing the language of drawing & principles of design, which is an essential skill for professional artists and designers. Dialogue and constructive criticism also help the artist/designer recognize the strengths and weaknesses of their work and others. Each student is expected to contribute to the discussion. In fact, your participation grade is based in part on your willingness to join in during the critique. Attending all critiques and working diligently during studio time is essential to maintaining your grade in the class. All assignments must be turned in through Canvas to receive credit, grades will be posted on Canvas.

Maintaining a **sketchbook** is crucial as an artist. During the semester your sketchbook will be used to record notes, ideas, thumbnail sketches, and weekly sketchbook assignments. Sketchbook assignments are meant to develop and strengthen your creative capacities, by offering an opportunity for personal experimentation and exploration, building off of the content covered in class. It is your responsibility to stay up to date with sketchbook assignments. There are a total of 15 sketchbook assignments during the semester (one per week). **Sketchbook assignments will be assigned every Monday and due on Wednesdays at midnight via canvas.** Students will photograph their sketchbook and upload the image (.jpg/.pdf/.png files only) to the correct weekly sketchbook in Canvas. The grading of sketchbooks is based on effort and execution of the assignment. It is expected that students take 45min-1hr on completing sketchbook assignments.

LATE WORK POLICY / MISSING CRITIQUE

Late or incomplete projects will **NOT** be critiqued and you will miss participation points for not having your project completed at the start of critique. There will be no opportunity to make up for these points lost for missing a critique. Projects turned in late will receive an automatic -**2pt**. **deduction**, and will only be accepted **one week** from the original due date of the assignment. Sketchbook assignments will receive -**.5 deduction** for late submissions. Exemptions of this policy will only be made if you have discussed with me via email in advance of the due date (not the day before) of a special circumstance or emergency. If you miss critique these points cannot be made up as it is done as a class discussion and there are only five during the course of the semester.
