COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is intended to introduce students to a variety of materials and methods for drawing, in order to develop the student's understanding of historical precedent and contemporary best practices in drawing. Emphasis is placed on developing the skills needed to draw accurately from life, experimentation in drawing, and creative/expressive development.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Department learning outcomes:

Students will be challenged to:

• create works of art that are based upon a highly developed concept.

• create works of art that have highly developed content.

• create works of art that exhibit a highly developed composition, based on the art elements and design principles.

• demonstrate a strong personal commitment to the process of creating works of art.

• produce works of art that demonstrate a high level of craftsmanship.

• write about their own artwork, using knowledge specific to the art/design discipline.

Course learning outcomes:

Students will be challenged to:

1. Obtain familiarity and ease with a range of traditional and contemporary drawing materials.

2. Develop the skills needed to draw accurately from life.

3. Effectively utilize inventive line quality and expressive value to add creative voice to their work.

4. Apply drawing techniques to express personal and inventive visual ideas.

5. Employ the tools of perspective to render the illusion of an invented and real-world three-dimensional space.

6. Contextualize the conventions, ideas, and traditions of drawing in art history and in a contemporary practice.

7. Utilize drawing vocabulary and critical thinking skills to critique the work of their classmates, themselves, and those in the broader art world(s).

METHODS

Instruction will be given through class lectures, demonstrations, small group discussions, one-on-one discussion with the instructor, videos on professional artists, hands on projects, class critiques, and peer reviews.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

ATTENDANCE

Attendance at all class sessions is required. Attendance in class means that you are prepared for class with all necessary materials, and actively engage with the discussions or working on your drawing project during the entire class period.

- Missing four classes will result in your final grade being reduced by one letter grade.
- Missing five classes will result in your grade being reduced by two letter grades.
- Missing six classes will result in failure of the class.
- Coming to class late three times is equivalent to one absence.
- Leaving class early is equivalent to either an absence or a tardy at the professor's discretion.

If you need to miss class because you are sick or have an emergency, please communicate this with me via email.

For chronic illness scenarios, students may contact the Educational Access Center (EAC) for a consultation. Note that the Wellness Center does not provide notes to students for illness.

STUDIO POLICIES

Eating and drinking: Eating and drinking will be allowed during lecture or discussion time but will not be allowed during studio work time in class.

Clean up: Keeping the studio space clean and organized is crucial to ensuring a safe and productive work environment for everyone. At the end of each class session, and at the end of any work session in the studio, all materials must be stored and work areas completely cleaned of excess charcoal, graphite, or other media.

Headphones: You are welcome to wear headphones during studio work time as long as the volume level allows you to still hear announcements.

Drawing Portfolios	 A large portion of class time will be used to complete drawing prompts. Since everyone works at a slightly different pace, sometimes students will need extra time outside of class to fully complete their work. The expectation is that all class drawing prompts be completed in full, according to the instructions, by the critique date. Sketchbooks	 Sketchbooks are meant to offer an opportunity for personal experimentation and exploration, with drawing prompts that build off of the content covered in class. Sketchbook assignments also include an opportunity to research drawing artists that interest you and expand your understanding of what drawing can be. Portfolio critiques	 Students will choose 2 of their strongest in-class drawings to be discussed by the entire class during class critiques. These critiques happen every 4-5 weeks and function as the "tests" of our class. These drawings should be chosen from the drawing assignments completed during class (but should not include sketchbook drawings). All portfolio critique dates are listed in the schedule, starting on page 6 of this syllabus.
