## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Within the context of Christian origins, an overview of the canonical literature of the New Testament with special attention to its literary history and theological themes.

## **COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES**

Students will Identify the historical context of the New Testament; articulate the unity of the New Testament in its canonical context within the diverse literature of the Christian canon; articulate and appreciate the ways in which the Bible, understood as given by divine inspiration, functions as the church's central norm for Christian discipleship, faith and practice; and articulate the basic content of the books of the New Testament and the methods appropriate to the interpretation of those books.

## **REQUIRED TEXTS**

- The New Testament in a modern translation. Preferred versions include the New Revised Standard Version and the New American Standard Bible
- Carter, Warren. What Does Revelation Reveal?
- Hylen, Susan. Women in the New Testament World

## ASSIGNMENTS:

- Reading the NT: Read assigned portions of the New Testament as listed in the schedule. Report the
  percentage of days that you read the assignment in Canvas by Friday, December 13. No late work is
  acceptable for this assignment—to receive credit, the reading must be done by the date indicated on
  the schedule.
- Essay 1: Due Tuesday, October 22. See details in Canvas.
- Essay 2: Due Tuesday, November 26. See details in Canvas.
- Midterm exam: approximately 100 multiple choice questions.
- Final exam: approximately 100 multiple choice questions and an essay.
